#### THE SOUTH ATLANTIC EXPORT COMPANY.

Details of Organization Completed at Columbia, S. C., Last Saturday.

Atlanta, Ga., Oct. 15,- With the organization of the South Atlantic Export eign tinde as they have not done before in their history, neconding to Atlanta business men. Atlanta, which has been the temporary headquarters of the company, has been made the permanent head quarters. It was thought for a time that these headquarters would be moved to Columbia, but no change will be made on account of the fact that the territory to be covered by the company has been extended westward, putting Atlanta near er its center. Traffic agencies have already been established in Unicago, Cincinnati and New York.

J. A. Von Doblen, of Atlanta, who has nen selectory since the organization was started will continue in that position, having been closted at the final organizaion meeting. Mr. Von Dohlen is recogsized as one of the most expert traffic men in the country, are has just return ed to Atlanta from the Columbia meeting and is enthusias to over the outlook for sutness manufactures in putting them alves before the world.
