APPEALS FOR MEMBERS OF COTTON ASSOCIATION
Governor Bickett Issues a Proclamation For the Cotton Association.

When folks are sick and all things go awry, "God and the doctor" is the cry. When folks are well and all things bright, God's forgot and the doctor slighted.

These homely lines explain the apparent apathy of some of our people in regard to the American Cotton Association. When the association was formed the cotton market was desperately sick and there was the wildest of business for the association. The condition of the market is tremendously improved; indeed it is approaching robust strength and there has been a consequent loss of interest in the "doctor".

"The association has done a monumental service to all the people of the cotton States, and it would be a tragic blunder to allow it to go into a decline."

More than any other agency the association demonstrated to buyers from every nation at the world cotton conference that the farmer has not been getting a fair price for his product. So impressed were the spinners from England with the facts furnished by the cotton association that they openly said that they did not desire to buy cotton produced under the conditions that have heretofore obtained in cotton States. The spinners urged the farmers to cooperate in the matter of production of baling, housing and transporting their cotton. These are the definite aims of the association and the success of all these undertakings will insure to the benefit of the farmer, the cotton spinner, the merchant, the banker and the consumer of cotton goods.

The association makes no appeal to class feeling or class prejudice, but urges all our people to join the association and cooperate in making our royal staple a blessing to all the people from producer to consumer.

"From November 10 to 15, 1919, inclusive, a drive for membership will be made in North Carolina. During that week I urge our people of every class to join this association. Give heed to the admonition of Governor Vance and remember the horse that pulled the plow."

NEWS AND NOTES FROM STATE CAPITAL

Raleigh, Nov. 8.—Telephone rates in North Carolina will be continued in effect on the present basis, which is in accordance with the wartime schedule arranged by the Federal Government, until further notice. This fact was made known Friday as the result of a ruling by the North Carolina Corporation Commission which ordered that the present rates should be continued in effect until changed by that body.

The Federal Government relinquished control of the telephone system July 20, but the rates charged for service, put in to effect by the government as a war measure, were continued in force until December 1, 1919.

Action in the matter came about as the result of a petition presented to the commission by two telephone companies, the Southern Bell and the Asheville Company, asking that no order be issued continuing these rates in effect in North Carolina for an indefinite period.

The matter was heard by the commission September 25, the telephone companies at that time presenting adequate testimony and exhibits to show the urgent necessity for continuing the present rates. Facts submitted by the telephone companies indicated that for the first seven months of 1919 they earned in each month, except April, less than the compensation to be paid them by the Government for the use of the property and that during July, 1919, in which all of the increased rates were in effect, they earned less than the expense of operation.

At the time the hearing was held no one appeared but the representatives of the petitioning companies, despite the fact that wide publicity was given through the press of the State. Following the hearing, however, representatives of a number of cities investigated the evidence presented by the telephone companies and with the exception of Winston-Salem and Asheville all objection to the continuance of wartime rates was waived.

Without the order the commission has issued the pre-war rates would prevail in the states after December 1, 1919, as the act of Congress under which the telephone properties were restored to their owners provided that the rates put into effect by the government should be continued until that date unless found upon investigation to be unreasonable.

The commission's order provides that any municipality interested or any individual using the telephone service may file a petition at any time for reduction or modification of the rates. It also calls for a statement from the companies showing the operators of the companies named as a whole in the State and separately for each exchange for the period from July 30, 1919, to January 1, 1920, and quarterly thereafter until further order.

As a means of checking the spread of the boll weevil in North Carolina a safety zone, thirty miles in width, has been established north of the infested district along Columbus, Brunswick and New Hanover counties and the shipment of cotton seed, bolls or cotton socks in any form except compressed bales to other sections of the State is prohibited. State quarantine regulations put in force by the State Department will be rigidly enforced.

Full scale investigation of a survey of conditions north of the weevil infested section made by R. W. Leiby, assistant state entomologist, it was determined that the weevil had made but little progress since first found at Lake in Columbus county. The southern boundary of the safety zone extends from the north Carolina line at a point west of Lenoir through the middle of Bladen county, thence across the southern end of Sampson county, west of Lenoir county, at Weldon and ends at the Atlantic at the intersection of P. 101 and Oakes roads.

The purpose of the safety zone is to check the general advance of the weevil by prohibiting the shipment of cotton seed, bolls or socks, except in compressed bales, from the weevil zone. As a further preventive measure another thirty mile wide safety zone may be established north of the safety zone. This action may be done because of the known fact that the weevil, flying at its best, may travel for a distance of 25 miles on a non-stop journey.

Governor T. W. Bickett is back in his office after a two-day hunting trip in Curran county, where he bagged grouse for the first time this season. He is expected to issue a proclamation this week declaring November 11, Armistice Day, a State holiday.

A blanket order has been issued by Acting Mayor Pace of the city against looters. In a statement sent to the chief of police he declares that the scarcity of labor makes it imperative that the city's officers be put to work. The order is containing testimony that all street cleaners are not necessarily house-drawn.

LUTHERAN CONFERENCE MET AT BETHEL CHURCH

Session of the North Carolina Conference of the Tennessee Lutheran Synod Held With Bethel Church, Near High Shoals.

The North Carolina Conference of the Lutheran-Tennessee Synod met at Bethel church near High Shoals at 10:30 a. m. on November 5, 1919. The following ministers were present: J. M. Senter, L. L. Lohr, D. D., A. R. Beck, E. J. Sox, J. A. Yount, J. C. Dietz, E. H. Kohn, Ph. D., A. L. Boliek, W. D. Wise, W. J. Roof, W. D. Haltiwanger, V. L. Palmer, C. N. Yount, H. B. Schaffner, O. W. Adlerholt, D. L. Miller, N. D. Yount, E. L. Conrad, W. J. Boger, L. D. Miller, W. A. Deaton, D. D., and C. R. W. Kegley. A full representation of lay delegates was also present.

The following officers were elected: Rev. J. C. Dietz, of Gastonia, president; Rev. W. J. Roof, of Emulation, secretary; and Rev. E. H. Kohn, Ph. D., of Mt. Holly, treasurer.

The conference sermon was delivered by the retiring president, Rev. J. M. Senter, after which the Lord's Supper was administered to the members of the conference.

At the afternoon session, devotional services were conducted by Rev. D. L. Miller. The president appointed the usual committees. At 2 p. m. the subject, "The Means of Grace" was presented by Rev. A. R. Beck. The former had special stress on the word as a means of grace. The latter on the sacraments as a means of grace. General discussion followed. The business then read his report, which went into the hands of the finance committee.

Thursday morning devotional services were conducted by Rev. A. R. Beck and on Foreign Missions by Rev. E. H. Kohn. The committee on unfinished business made its report, which was adopted.

Friday morning devotional services were conducted by Rev. E. H. Kohn, Ph. D. The board of pastors reported that the congregations at Morganton and Helebrum had been combined in one pastorate to be known as the Morganton pastorate. St. Stephens, near Hickory, was chosen as the place for the next meeting of the conference on Wednesday.
