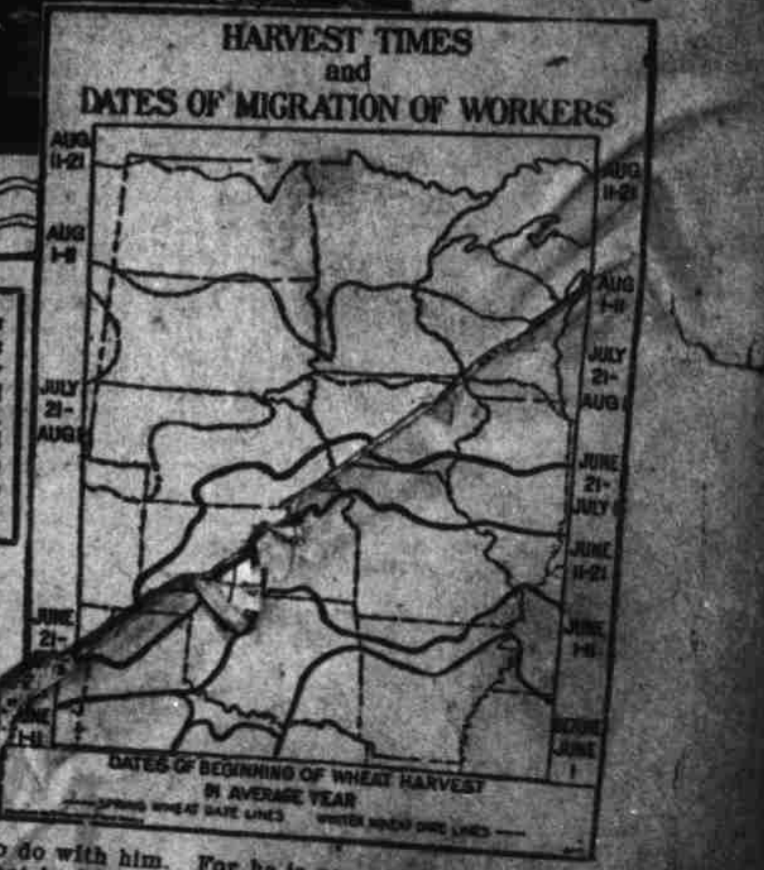
GAMBLERS TRAIL HARVESTER AND REAP HARVEST FROM HIM



A FRIENDLY GAME Until Some Professional Gambler "Spots" It and Takes a Hand

The migrant worker has none of the protections of Society. He has no home. No community stands behind him. No organization sees that he gets fair play. He is the prey of the gamblers, the crooked politicians, the police stool pigeons and the yeggman. He is a worker-outcast. The Interchurch World Movement is now making a survey of his problems to bring about a closer co-operation of the churches of America in its solution.

Each fall, in the wake of the great harvests, comes the parasite of the harvester to reap a harvest for himself. He is the gambler. For him the harvester is traditional prey. More than that, the gambler has the spell to which he yields willingly—the spell of the game of chance. And for cards and games of chance the harvester has a passion. He does not recognize the gambler as a parasite who feeds upon him, day after day and has a thrill to it. And that, after all, in the fields, is a thing for which to the victim begins, penniless, the quest of the next job. And often, at the end of the next job, the parasite still at his heels, spotting the migrant laborer. That is being a wandering worker being living conditions of the Movement, which aims to present the interchurch problem to the Protestant churches of these churches in its solution. The interchurch movement, the survey is revealing, at almost every agency that has anything to do with him. For he is an outcast in the sense that he has no social base. Sometimes the private employment agency, sometimes the railroad and social attitude toward him. For he seems to them little more than a working hobo. An unscrupulous employer will use him as a strike breaker, with no intention of giving him a permanent place. A ward politician will buy him at election time. These are incidents in his migrant career. But the parasite who trails him through the harvest is constant, and the harvest of his life is always rich.



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
