## TRANSIENT LABOR CAMP PLANNED FOR MOUNT OLIVE AREA

**E. C. Casey Chairman of Committee to Promote Project**

A transient labor camp to serve the Mount Olive area is being planned by farmers and business men working in co-operation with Wayne county war board. This area, includes all of Wayne county, upper Duplin, and part of Sampson.

E. C. Casey, of Mount Olive, has been appointed chairman of a committee to promote the project. Serving with him are L. P. Wells, Albert Cox, E. F. Sutton and Edward Southerland, all of Mount Olive; John Albritton of Calypso, and N. M. Wiggins, of Dudley.

C. S. Mintz, of Goldsboro, the Wayne county farm agent, said that the farmers were co-operating to the fullest extent with the government on the war goals. He said that at the last meeting the men asked for a minimum of 200 workers, in order that food might not spoil in the fields.

## SHIP TO BE NAMED FOR GREATUNCLE OF TWO LOCAL WOMEN

**William Moseley Ancestor Mrs. Davis and Mrs. Oliver**

It has been announced that the Wilmington Shipyard will launch another liberty ship in Wilmington March 3, to be named the William D. Moseley, in honor of William Dunn Moseley, elected the first governor of Florida on June 26, 1845.

Governor Moseley was born on February 1, 1795, at Moseley Hall, now LaGrange, N. C., and on May 23, 1823 was married to Miss Susan Hill, sister of Dr. John Hill, of Wilmington and Goldsboro. He was the great-greatuncle of Mrs. A. J. Davis, of Mount Olive, and the great-great-greatuncle of Mrs. C. W. Oliver, Sr., of Mount Olive.

The Florida governor graduated with high rank at Chapel Hill in 1818 in the same class with James K. Polk. He was a senator in the legislature of North Carolina from 1829 to 1839.

Descendants of the Faison family in eastern North Carolina trace their kinship to the Moseleys through the marriage of Susan Moseley, sister of Governor Moseley to William Faison, of Sampson county, on February 18, 1814, and the marriage of another sister, Maria Moseley, to Thomas I. Faison, also of Sampson county.

## SET UP COMPLETED FOR THE RED CROSS MEMBERSHIP DRIVE

**Chairmen Named to Handle Campaign; Quota Quadrupled.**

M. J. Hatcher, chairman of the Red Cross membership drive in Mount Olive, announced yesterday that his committee has completed the set-up of workers to conduct the campaign this year, and that the quota for Mount Olive was four times that of any previous year.

In a letter to his co-workers, Chairman Hatcher said, "The good the Red Cross is now doing exceeds that of all times, many times more than four, because they are answering the call on the battle front and the home as cheerfully as ever.

"The funds that we raise will go to relieve those who are fighting to preserve the dignity of our nation and our love for a peaceful environment. These men are made up of our very flesh and blood, perhaps a father, son, brother or husband, and they deserve the best we can give and we cannot let them down."
