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The Florida Brief

One of the first Southern States to file a brief with the U. S. Supreme Court, on the question of integrating the public schools, was the State of Florida.

years—about seventy—Florida has maintained a dual system of schools.

It argued that "time, tact, and wisdom" were necessary if segregated schools were to be ended in Florida in an equitable manner "without destroying the school system."

Florida Attorney-General Richard Erwin, in his brief, told the Court that many states were now faced with "the toughest job in practical government . . . ever . . . without going to war."

Erwin reported that a poll of both Negroes and whites in Florida had shown that three-fourths of the white leaders in that state disagreed with the Supreme Court decision to integrate the schools.

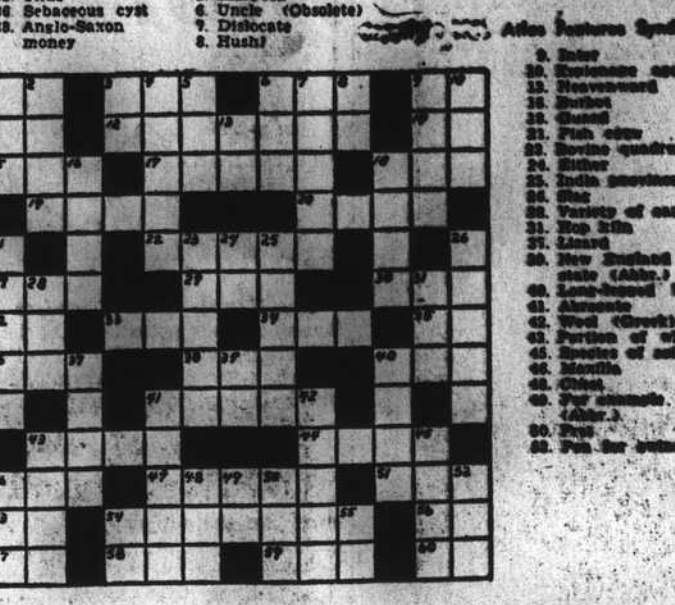
We believe the Florida brief represents the general conditions—with degrees varying, of course—of most Southern States. We think that the Court would do well to give it very serious considerations, and point out that the main reason that violence and serious trouble have not occurred in the Deep South as yet is because the Deep South has delayed taking any action until arguments on methods to bring about integration are heard by the Supreme Court in December.

The Florida brief seems to offer a practical solution to this problem.
