## Modern Etiquette

Q—Please give some tips on giving of a buffet supper.

A—Anytime between five and eight p.m. Hot dishes, salads, rolls, appetizers, dessert and beverages are served. The dishes, napkins and silverware are placed on the table with the food, and the guests help themselves. This is a good way to entertain a large gathering without maid service.

Q—Do good manners today disapprove of tinted stationery for informal correspondence?

A—No, provided the shades are not too garish. Men, of course, should stick to white stationery.

Q—When giving an informal dinner, how should the invitation be issued?

A—Either by brief note, or over the telephone.

Q—From which side should one

properly sit down in his chair at the dinner table?

A—From whichever side is more convenient.

A—He should try immediately to draw the two new acquaintances into conversation.

Q—When cheese is served with apple pie, should it be eaten with the fork or fingers?
