A social hour followed, during which time the hostesses served refreshments.

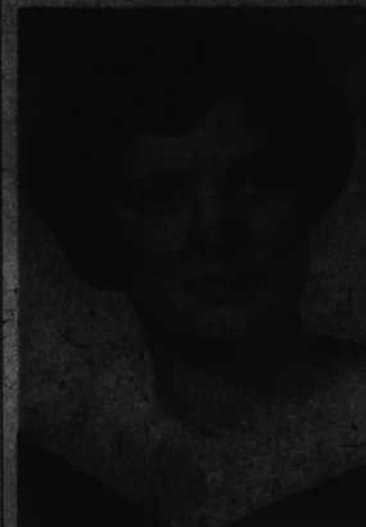
Stanford Circles Met Last Sunday Night
