Cotton Ginning Prices Fixed.

The United States Food Administration has set a price of of three dollars fifty cents per bale as a reasonable charge for ginning cotton that weighs five hundred lbs. or less and an additional charge of eighty cents per hundred lbs. for all over that amount, asking that no bales be ginned weighing over five hundred seventy five pounds.

The charge for bagging and ties must be market value plus ten per cent.

We will follow instructions of the Food Administration in the operation of our gin and in following same we do not find it necessary to change our method of doing business and having kept our gin plant at a high point of efficiency we will continue to give our customers the same satisfactory work they have had in the past.
