THOMAS JEFFERSON

The Friend of the People

"Rebellion to Tyrants is Obedience to God"—Jefferson's Seal.

The highest proof of the arrogant, and impotent, determination of the Roman Catholic hierarchy to possess this nation, is uncovered by the announcement that the Tammany Governor of New York, Alfred E. Smith, has been invited to make an address on Americanism at Monticello, Virginia, Thomas Jefferson's home, on July 4th. The Associated Press sends this "news" broadcast. We see headlines of this character emblazoned in the local press: "Monticello is Smith's Chance."—Washington will watch the Governor's Invasion. All South to be on the alert. If he "sells" himself to Dixie nomination is assured."

A Protestant American, Stuart G. Gibboney, the official head and spokesman of the Thomas Jefferson Memorial Association, is the avenue through whom Jesuitical manipulation in characteristic fashion has worked, to bring about this heinous insult to American ideals, to Virginia, and to the whole South, but specifically to Virginia, who gave America, in her most crucial national emergencies, George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, James Monroe, James Madison, Chief Justice Marshall, Patrick Henry, and others, and with the exception of Pennsylvania, the majority number of the signers of the Declaration of Independence, Virginia, named after the Virgin Queen, Elizabeth, whose Protestant forces, under fiat of God, routed the Roman Catholic Spanish invasion of England, and destroyed the Spanish Armada, Virginia, freedom's missionary, who first rang our spiritual Liberty Bell, in June, 1776, and set the example for this nation, by declaring herself a free and independent State Virginia, who at this moment has given us Commander Richard Evelyn Byrd, the young Protestant American, who, through the overcoming of tremendous obstacles, has achieved the crowning victory of discovery by air, the hitherto unknown Arctic area beyond the North Pole.

So far the writer has been unable to find any editorial, or individual protest against this Judas act, which, in its serpentine subtleties, is the crowning foot step in the efforts of Rome, to place a Roman Catholic in the White House.

The Pope of Rome has sent his active emissaries throughout all European countries, to instruct Roman Catholics, who have family—or any other sort of—contact with America, to command their "allies" to use every energy, toward the accomplishment of the nomination of Alfred E. Smith for President of the United States.

The pseudo, foreign born, citizens of this nation are working day and night to this end. A Protestant Hungarian friend recently informed me that a Roman Catholic Hungarian priest, direct from Hungary, had called upon her, to attempt to arouse her sympathies in this work. The priest informed her that orders had been given direct from Rome, throughout America, for concentrated organized activity in achieving this hellish coup of Rome, which would be the open door to world-wide domination by the Jesuitically directed, Roman political machine, which

blashemously masquerades as a Church.

There is no death The Master Soldier, the Commander in Chief of Christ's visible and invisible army, declared "Heaven and earth shall pass away, but my words shall not pass away."

God has spoken throughout the ages through His prophets. The makers of America were prophets of God. Let us listen and heed the voice of God, through Thomas Jefferson, as his Christ selfhood denounced Rome, in letters written from Monticello, to trusted and tested friends.

On December 6, 1813, Jefferson wrote to Baron Alexander von Humboldt, who had just returned from Mexico, where he (von Humboldt) carefully investigated conditions similar to those which are stirring Mexico to the foundations today: In this letter the Monroe Doctrine is foreshadowed. Jefferson writes:

"I think it most fortunate that your travels in those countries were so timed to make known to the world in the moment they were about to become actors on its stage. They will throw off their European dependence. I have no doubt. History, I believe, furnishes no example of a priest ridden people maintaining a free civil government. This marks the lowest grade of ignorance, of which their civil, as well as religious, leaders will always avail themselves for their own purposes. . . and Mexico, where we learn from you, that men of science are not wanting, may revolutionize itself under better auspices. . . But in whatever governments they end, they will be American governments, no longer to be involved in the never ceasing broils of Europe."

And later in writing to President Monroe, on the Monroe Doctrine, from Monticello Oct. 24, 1823, Jefferson warns against the "Lawless alliance, calling itself Holy."—(We need to keep always before us, that the Monroe Doctrine was formulated as a protection against the so called "Holy Alliance," which was an alliance formed by Roman Catholicism.)

In a letter to Michael McGear, written May 29, 1823, on Home and Foreign Missions, Jefferson declares that "were the pope, or his holy allies, to send in mission to us some thousands of Jesuit priests, to convert us to their orthodoxy, I suspect we should deem it as a national aggression on our peace and faith."

With these divinely conceived, and openly expressed statements of the author of the Declaration of Independence, which warn against the Roman Catholic menace, in every phase of its ecclesiastical and political treacheries, with these statements, gained from years of personal contact, experience and close observation, before us, could a greater crime be perpetrated against America and Thomas Jefferson, yea, against the very tenets of the Declaration of Independence, than the extending of this Jesuitically manipulated invitation of the Rome's benchman, Alfred E. Smith, to address Americans on July 4th, at the consecrated home of Thomas Jefferson?

The Flood Situation.

The Mississippi valley in the States of Mississippi, Arkansas and Louisiana, the country is flooded. Ten million acres of farming land is under several feet of water. Seventy five to one hundred thousand people are homeless. The losses will amount up into many millions of dollars—sums that will never be known. Sicknes has broken out among the flood refugees, and many have been drowned, the number of these will never be known, only guessed at. Help is asked, and money and supplies are coming in to the troubled zone in millions of dollars. The American people are sympathetic and helping in trouble.

It is said to be the greatest flood ever known, but we recall that steamboats ran into houses fifteen miles from the Mississippi River channel forty odd years ago. That was something like the one they now have.

To the Clerks of the Court and the Pension Boards.

The General Assembly of 1927 made certain changes in the pension laws of the State. A soldier who is totally blind or who has been paralyzed and is totally disabled by reason thereof will hereafter draw \$300 a year, payable monthly through the Clerk of the Court, instead of \$300 00 as heretofore.

All other Confederate soldiers now on the pension roll, or who are eligible for pension under the general pension law, will draw one dollar a day, payable semi annually. The first payment will be in December 1927 and the second in June 1928.

The marriage date was also changed. A widow in order to be eligible for pension must have been married prior to January 1st, 1880, but widows now on the pension roll by reason of some previous statutes will not be taken off.

Class 'A', widows who are blind in both eyes or totally helpless and confined to the house will receive \$300 00, all other widows \$100 00 a year.

Except as mentioned above, the general pension law has not been changed. The property qualification is still in the law.

The legislature appropriated for the year beginning July 1st, 1927, \$500,000.00 for the widows and \$900,000.00 for the soldiers, and for the year beginning July 1st, 1928, they appropriated \$500,000.00 for the widows and \$600,000.00 for the soldiers.

The fall session of Presbytery will be held at Elise in September.
