At the regular meeting of the county commissioners held Monday at the court-house, it was ordered that a meeting of the citizens of Hoke County be held at the courthouse in Raeford on Saturday, December 12, at 1.30 p. m., to consider the advisability of continuing the farm demonstration work of the radio and motion picture star, was county.
