

J. M. Broughton of Raleigh led Lieutenant Governor Wilkins P. Horton by about 40,000 votes in the race for the Democratic nomination for governor of North Carolina in the primary last Saturday.

With almost all the state's precincts reported the race for governor stood about as follows: Broughton 141,700; Horton 101,878; Maxwell 97,739; Gravely 59,588; Cooper 32,435; Grady 15,050; Simmons 2,430.

Representative W. O. Burgin led in the eighth district race for Congressman with a total vote of 18,496. Following him was his close secondof two years ago, C. B. Deane, with around 8,000 votes in the 12 counties of the district.

The vote for Deane and Burgin in the district is as follows: Anson-Bur-719, Deane 479; Hoke-Burgin 713, Deane 558; Lee-Burgin 1165, Deane Deane 715; Moore - Burgin 1652, Deane 1106; Wilkes-Burgin 2528, Deane 1183; Yadkin - Burgin 849, Burgin 1161.

All incumbent state officers who had opposition were renominated by wide margins and all carried majorities in Hoke county by about the same proportions they won in the state. These included Commissioner of Agriculture W. Kerr Scott, Auditor George Ross Pou, Secretary of State Thad Eure and Insurance Commissioner Dan C. Boney.
