General Honeycutt. All three perished in the crash. The plane left Fort Brakk at 6:10 p. m. Fiday and was due in Jacksonville about 8:30 o'clock that night. Some residents of Brunswick, Ga., midway between Savannah and Jacksonville, said they heard a plane overhead about 8 p. m. Friday, but this report was unidentified.

General Honeycutt, a veteran of 36 years service, came to Fort Bragg as commandant Friday, September 13. His previous command had been at Fort Stotensburg, P. I. "We don't think we will ever know
