Dinner for 3 or 4
Sliced Roast Beef
Hashed Browned Potatoes
Buttered Carrots
Bread Medley Conserve
Sliced Cucumbers
Cherry Sauce
Red Devil's Food Cake, Frosted Coffee.

Medley Conserve
4 cups diced pineapple.
1 cup water.
4 cups sliced apples.
6 cups seeded red cherries.
1 tablespoon cinnamon.
1 teaspoon cloves.
1 teaspoon salt.
1-3 cup lemon juice.
1 tablespoon grated lemon rind.
12 cups granulated sugar.

Boil pineapple and water gently ten minutes; add the other fruits and boil slowly five minutes. Mix in the rest of the ingredients and let stand several hours—over night is satisfactory. Boil rather quickly until the conserve thickness. Stir frequently. Pour into sterilized jar and seal immediately.

1 cup granulated sugar.
2 eggs.
1/2 cup sour milk (or buttermilk).
1 teaspoon vanilla.
2 squares chocolate, melted.
1/2 cup boiling water.

1/4 teaspoon salt.

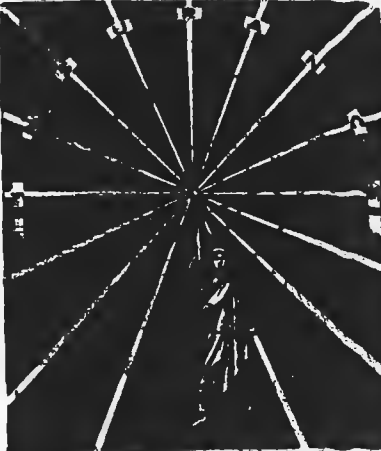
There will be a community singing at Rockfish church Sunday afternoon beginning at 1:30 o'clock. The public is cordially invited to attend.
