

**State College Answers Timely Farm Questions**

Question—What are the main points in getting the highest price for eggs?

Answer—T. T. Brown, Extension poultry specialist of State College, has outlined a six-point program for selling quality eggs: (1) Grade for size and interior quality; (2) candle to remove stale eggs and ones with blood spots, and to separate according to interior quality; (3) make at least two grade sizes, and use extremely large, very small, and dirty eggs at home; (4) clean slightly dirty or stained eggs with emery cloth or ramp cloth and soda, but never wash them; (5) use good cases with clean fillers and flats, or pack eggs in attractively labeled cartons; and (6) market eggs twice weekly.

Question—What vegetables are adapted to cold frames?

Answer—Such vegetables are cabbage, cauliflower, lettuce, tomato, pepper and eggplant started in shallow boxes in the house may be transferred to coldframes in order to develop stocky plants and to harden them before setting in the garden, says H. R. Niswonger, Extension horticulturist. Coldframes are also used as a seed bed in growing plants of the above vegetables for late season planting. The coldframe should be located in a sunny place, facing the South.

**Audition for Youth Orchestra To Be Held In February**

John A. Lang, State NYA Administrator, has announced plans for state-wide preliminary auditions to be held during the month of February for Leopold Stokowski's All-American Youth Orchestra.

Under an agreement which has been worked out by Aubrey Williams, National Youth Administrator, and the noted conductor, state and local offices of the National Youth Administration will receive applications and arrange for the preliminary auditions, in which five of the best musicians in each state will be selected.

Mr. Stokowski himself will make a nation-wide tour starting March 4 from Hollywood to conduct the final auditions, in which he will select the 100 members of the orchestra. This orchestra of "musical ambassadors" will make a tour of cities in Canada, Mexico and the United States, starting in May.

The great interest aroused in the musical talents of young people through NYA recruitment of the first Stokowski youth orchestra last winter, and the success of the orchestra's tour of Latin-American cities, was given by Mr. Williams as the reason for this new activity.

A uniform application form is being sent to all local NYA offices and are now available to all applicants.

**Civil Service Exams**

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced that applications will be accepted at its Washington office for the positions listed below not later than the closing dates specified. Where two dates are given, the first applies to applications received from states east of Colorado, the second to those from Colorado and states westward. The salary in each case is subject to a 3% per cent retirement deduction.

Inspector (subsistence supplies), various grades, with salaries ranging from \$1,620 to \$2,600 a year, Quartermaster Corps, War Department. Applications will be rated as received until further notice.

Assistant home economist, \$2,600 a year, in the following fields: Food economics, clothing economics, family economics, family economics writer, and assistant in home economics information. Home economics specialist in food utilization, various grades, with salaries from \$2,600 to \$4,600 a year. Associate home economist in food economics or family economics, and associate in food composition, \$3,200 a year. Closing dates are February 17 and 20, 1941.

Full information as to the requirements for the examinations; and application forms may be obtained from the Secretary of the Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners at the post office or customhouse in any city which has a post office of the first or second-class, or from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

**List Your Property Give In Your Poll January 20th to March 1st**

Notice is hereby given to all persons owning Real or Personal Property that they appear before the tax lister for their Township during the period from January 20th to March 1st and make return to him of said property for purposes of taxation. All male persons are required to give in their poll, if their ages are between 21 and 50.

All persons failing to list in the required time will be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction, fined or imprisoned. A minimum penalty of \$1.00 will be charged for failure to list.
