HIGHWAY ROBBERY.

Proposition to abolish alternate numbering of highway routes is one of the unfairest pieces of legislation which has yet been introduced in the General Assembly. Reference is specifically to the bill fathered by Senator E. C. Brooks, Jr, of Dur-ham. It is a measure aimed directly at diverting tourist traffic from the highway which passes through Raleigh and Fayetteville and giving that traffic to the highway which passes through Durham.

There were many who believed that the road through Raleigh and Fayetteville should have had the original and sole designation as No. 15—a route which runs by the same number from Walterboro, S. C., to Rochester, N. Y. However, by compromise years ago the road through Durham was given the designation 15, while the road through Fayetteville and Raleigh-although shorter -accepted the designation 15-A. This is what the Durham crew is trying to take away from Fayetteville and Raleigh today.


