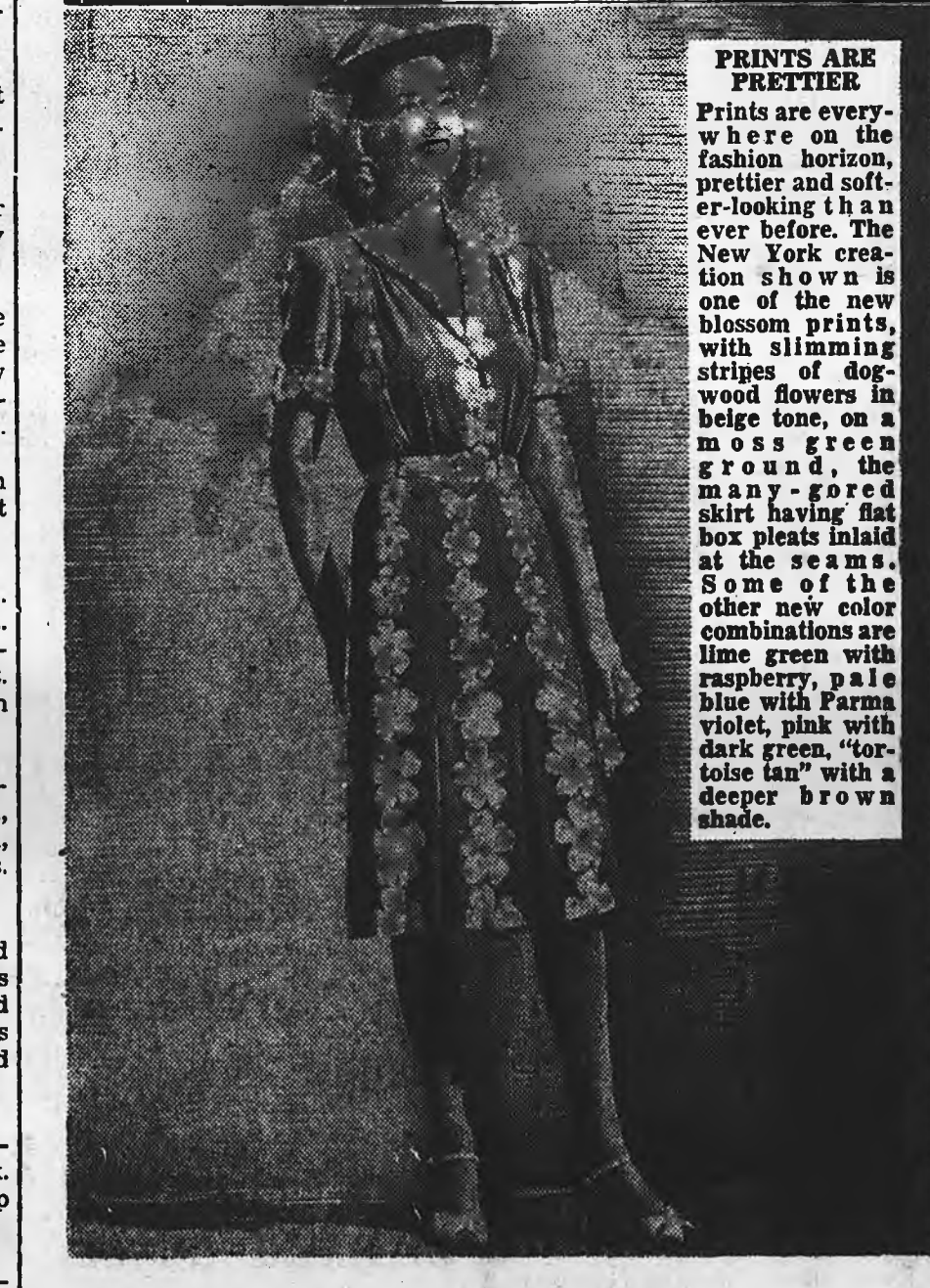
GIRL SCOUTS WILL COLLECT BOOKS
