The Extension director listed eight reasons why farmers dread inflation. First, he said, inflation creates a feeling of prosperity which is not sound. It tends to get farmers into debt for such things as land and machinery, which they cannot pay for quickly.

Third, inflation gets farmers into the habit of living above their income. Inflation increases taxes and public debt. It reduces tendencies to



save and discourages thrift. Sixth, it establishes a price level higher than normal to which farmers adjust their level of living and outlook on life, which cannot be maintained. Inflation means higher prices which make it hard for low income farm families to buy what they need. And finally, it makes dollars cheaper. Therefore, farmers have to borrowhave to mortgage for the future.


