Wilmington, July 29.-Men and boys from all over eastern North Car olina will take oath of enlistment here on August 8th, as New Hanover and surrounding counties take time off to observe a Navy Day all their

Men who are subject to military duty in the near future, and those the Naval Reserve is offering, are in rent remain at \$75? vited to be among the group when Lieut. C. B. Neely, officer in charge of the States Navy Recruiting Ser vice, administers the oath of enlist ment to what is expected to be the largest group of Eastern North Caro lina men ever enlisted in one day.

The age limits are from 17 to 50. and men who have been previously rejected because of physical reasons, especially concerning eyes and teeth, are asked to visit the Wilmington Re cruiting Station as soon as possible. The office is located on the second floor of the post office here.

For men who are qualified in particular trade, there are many rat ings available—up to Chief Petty Officer, with pay of \$126 per month, plus allowances for dependents. Ev ery man who enlists in the Navy or Naval Reserve now is allowed speci fic amounts to care for his family.

In the enlistment ceremonies on August 8, many Naval officials from this section will be on hand to extend their congratulations to the men who are pitching in now when they are ties? needed. Needless to say, these men will be given special considerations, fine of \$5,000 and imprisonment for applicants of August 8 to go through the physical examination at Raleigh.

Act or any regulation, order or re quirement thereunder. The Act also states: . . . the Administrator may, regulation or order, regulate or pro hibit...renting or leasing practices (including practices relating to recov ery of the possession) likely to result in rent increases...inconsistent with the purposes of this Act.

Q. If a tenant doesnt have a writ ten lease, do the same restrictions against eviction hold?

A. Yes, an agreement to rent does not have to be in written form for a tenant to enjoy all the benefits and ant. protection of Federal rent control. Q. If a tenant does have a lease,

can he be evicted merely because his lease has expired?

A. No, the tenant can continue oc cupying the quarters as long as he continues to pay his rent. However, if the landlord wants him to, he must renew the lease at the same rent and for the period of his expiring lease or for one year, whichever is shorter. Q. Are there any conditions under which a landlord can regain posses sion of his property by evicting the

A. Yes, there are various circum stances whereby a tenant can be evic ted. Among them are:

(1) failure to pay his legal rent; (2) violation of a substantial obli gation of his rental agreement, such as maintaining a fire hazard on the premises, or renting the house for dwelling purposes and then using it for a store;

(3) committing a nuisance or using the dwelling unit for immoral or ille

gal purposes; (4) when the landlord, in good faith, wants to get his house or dwel ling unit back for his own occupancy;

(5) when the landlord wants to get the property back for the purpose of selling it to another person who has agreed in writing to buy it for his own occupancy:

(6) when the landlord wants to get his property back for extensive remodeling or alteration which can not be done while the tenant is occu pying the property.

Q. Are there other circumstances under which a tenant can be evict

A. Yes. But in every case except for non payment of the legal rent, grounds for it.

> A. No, the landlord is entitled to petition the Area Rent Director to set a new maximum rent substanti ally in line with what similar houses were bringing on the maximum date.

A. No, when a new tenant moves in, he may petition the Area Rent Director to set a new maximum rent. Q. An owner, unable to make bad ly needed repairs in a house, let a

tenant take the place as is on the agreement that the tenant would make such repaires as he wanted and would pay only \$24 a month. This rent was in effect on the maximum rent date. Since then the tenant has moved and the owner now wants to put the house back in shape but he can not afford to if he can charge no more than \$24. What should he do?

A. The owner, on completing repairs, must petition the Area Rent Director to bring the maximum rent back into line with what similar hous es in good repair brought on the max imum rent date.

First the work of grow ing them is done in late summer and fall, when you have more time than during the rush of spring work; sec ondly, many of them make sure fire mass shows of color equaled by few perennials.
