The Fayetteville Observer came to our place as long ago as I can remember. It was a weekly newspaper. It first became a daily, four pages, only a few years ago.

The Carthage Blade was started in the summer of 1878 or '79, published by H. A. Foote. This was the first paper I subscribed for. The North Carolina Presbyterian was published in Fayetteville, beginning in the 70's. It was a good paper. The publishers moved to Wilmington during the 80's. It died there.

John A. Oats published the North Carolina Baptist in Fayetteville in the 90's, and around the turn of the century he sold out to the Biblical Recorder. Oats' was a church paper, but in Church paper form. It was a four-page, six-column paper. He made some money, it was believed, when he sold it.

Restrictions on Few Items to Be Sent Overseas

Soldiers overseas may have written home for matches, cash money, cigarette lighter fluid or intoxicants, but don't send overseas troops any of these items, Headquarters Four Service Command has warned.

Mailing restrictions were listed to insure delivery of Christmas presents sent the foreign-duty soldiers by December 25 and the Army Postal Service reissued a plea for all Christmas parcels of overseas destination to be mailed between October 1 and November 1.

Requests made by the soldiers for matches and cigarette lighter fluid because of the difficulty of obtaining matches in many parts of the world will have to go unfilled because of the danger of spontaneous combustion in mail sacks is too great. However, cigarette lighters may be mailed but be sure to leave out the fluid.

Cash money is useless as a gift to troops overseas because in many places where U. S. soldiers are stationed, it is about like work in a garage. I guess, and a fellow has to cleanup when his day's work is done, or "he is a sight."

There is a fine chance for a famine in the United States of America, at least we are going to have a mighty poor living. Dairymen in the Central Western States are selling out their dairy cows for beef, and a dearth of milk will begin in that part of the country. The reason they give for quitting is a want of labor to make feed.

Most people think too much of money. If there is no butter and milk to be had, you cannot get any for love or money. There will be a scarcity of cheese as well as a butter. There will be a scarcity of all meats. You cannot eat your money. The reason for the scarcity of all such is a scarcity of labor to make feed.

It may get as bad here as it has been in Greece for instance. Men walking the streets, begin to stagger, and finally fall and die on the streets. We have read of famines in other parts of the earth, but it has never come to this country. War work and high prices has made laborers foolish, and seem determined to quit work altogether, because they cannot get as high wages as they think they should get. You can buy more with wages you can get here in Raeford than you can get with what you have left after you pay expenses in New York City. Both the stipend and the expense account should be considered in a job.

John McRae and Gus Williford named the post office established at their store just this side of the bridge over Rockfish on the Fayetteville road two miles back in the latter 80's. J. W. McLaughlin bought out McRae & Williford, after he had operated a turpentine business in South Carolina for some years, and had sold that, and returned to his native land.

Dr. and Mrs. A. P. Dickson had more children than they could send to boarding school, particularly those in the primary grades, so after consulting Mr. McLaughlin, a believer in education, they resolved to establish a college preparatory school here on the McRae land. Raeford Institute resulted, and it opened its doors in 1895. The farmers living in this section of the counties of Robeson and Cumberland bought lots and built homes here—had to furnish homes, one here and the other on the farm—and they were at home all right at either place.

Raeford Institute was a good school, and a number of its pupils got an education and entered the gospel ministry. Being a teacher is no great thing, but being good enough to preach is a worthy achievement. Raeford Institute Scholars were trained morally as well as intellectually. School children and other convicts are not.

tioned there is a local prohibition against importation of United States money, so much money could not be spent. When sending money to soldiers in other countries use Domestic Postal Money Orders which may be cashed at Army Post Offices anywhere. Money orders overseas are paid in local foreign currency at the current rate of exchange.

Postage for these Christmas packages must be fully prepaid at the regular parcel post rate, only to the port of embarkation. Each should be limited to the size of an ordinary shoe box and weigh no more than six pounds; should be securely wrapped to withstand rigorous handling; and should be wrapped so as to permit ready inspection of the contents by the censors. Not more than one Christmas parcel may be mailed in any one week to the same addressee.

Gifts of a personal, utilitarian nature should be sent overseas troops, according to the Army Postal Service. Miscellaneous contents, such as candies, soaps, toilet articles and the like should be packed tightly. Sharp-pointed or sharp-edged instruments such as razors, knives or scissors should have their points or edges protected. Thin pasteboard boxes should be enclosed in wood, metal or corrugated pasteboard.

Sealed packages of candy, cigars, tobacco and toilet articles may be enclosed within parcels without affecting the parcel post classification of such packages.

A recent War Department survey conducted at ports of embarkation disclosed that approximately 10 per cent of all mail intended for delivery members of the armed forces overseas is incorrectly or insufficiently addressed.

The Army Postal Service reissued the request that all mail addressed to Army personnel serving outside the continental limits of the United States should clearly show: the full name, serial number, service organization and Army Post Office number of the addressee.

BRISTLES

All brushes made in the United States, except for war contracts and local health regulations, must contain at least 45 per cent of material other than pig and hog bristles, the WPB has ruled.

DIVERSION

The Government is urging wheat growers who are planning their production for 1943 to divert as much wheat acreage as possible to crops more needed in the war program.

CABBAGE

The Government purchase program has provided a market for much of the fall cabbage crop in the mountain counties which otherwise would have rotted in the field.
