

5,390.000 food parcels distributed to prisoners of war, 925,000 surgical dressings made, 12,000,000 garments made and 2,500,000 kit bags prepared. A list of the Hoke County chapter's part in the above work was published in the News-Journal last week.

The Red Cross has approximately 50,000 Army and Navy nurses on duty, operates 300 clubs and recrea-tion centers and has 2,300 sun rooms for the use of men who have been hospitalized.

In addition to its war work, the local chapter is always ready when trouble strikes. Four families whose homes were burned during the past year were aided in starting housekeeping again. A wheel chair was bought for the use of invalid persons in the county, persons ill or in trouble have been assisted, first aid kits and medical supplies have been given to schools, and classes in first aid home nursing have been taught in high schools of the county.

A PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS these wartime activities, including the collection of life-saving blood for the wounded, recreation work in military hospitals, provision of mid to families of servicemen, shipment of food parcels to prisoners of war, production of surgical dressings, operation of overseas clubs and recreation centers, and recruitment of Army and Navy nurses, all combine to save countless lives, restore hope, and provide comfort for our fighting mont

WHEREAS, through its wast network of local chapters, this agency of our people simultaneously conducts an extensive program of training and community service, while continuing with traditional efficiency to lessen the distress of those overshelmed by disaster; and

WHEREAS this agency is wholly dependent upon individual support and personal participation and is issuing its 1944 appeal to the entire citizen-> ship for a minimum War Fund of \$200,000,000;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT, President of the United States of America and President of the American National Red Gross, do hereby desig-mate the month beginning March 1, 1944 as "Red Gross Month" and earnestly be-seech sy fellow Americans to observe it by opening their hearts to this : humanitarian appeal in order that we may keep the Red Gross at the side of our fighting men and their dependents in their hour of greatest need.
