

### State College Answers Timely Farm Questions

Question: When should I select my turkeys for breeding?  
Answer: Now is just the time, says Prof. Roy S. Dearstyne, State College,

because the major marketing season is coming soon. Too often the selection of birds for breeding is postponed until the last minute and, as a result, many birds that should be kept as breeders find their way to market. Selection of toms is important because the tom has a much greater influence than the hen in the flock. Selected toms should be well developed, free from pin feathers, and reasonably fat. Birds with extremely long or short shanks

should not be saved as breeders. Birds with such abnormalities as crooked placements may be required and they may be hard to find later.

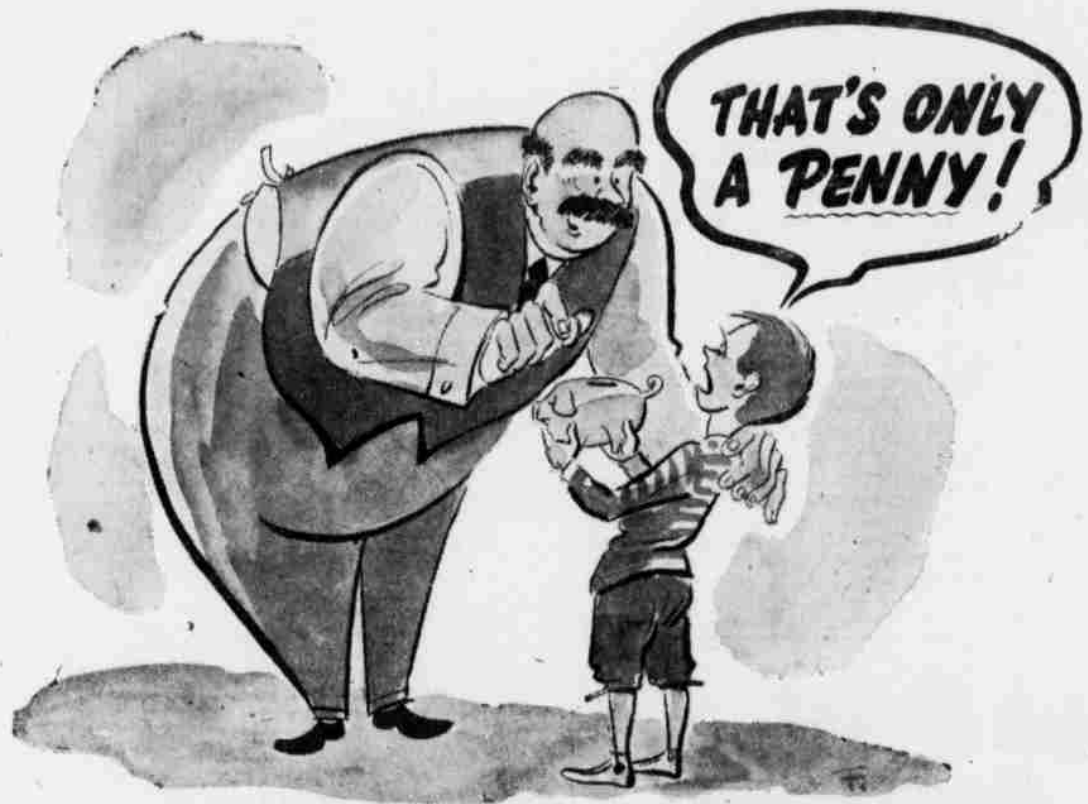
