Mrs. J. M. Pendergrass of Timberland had the misfortune of falling last Wednesday evening, breaking several ribs.

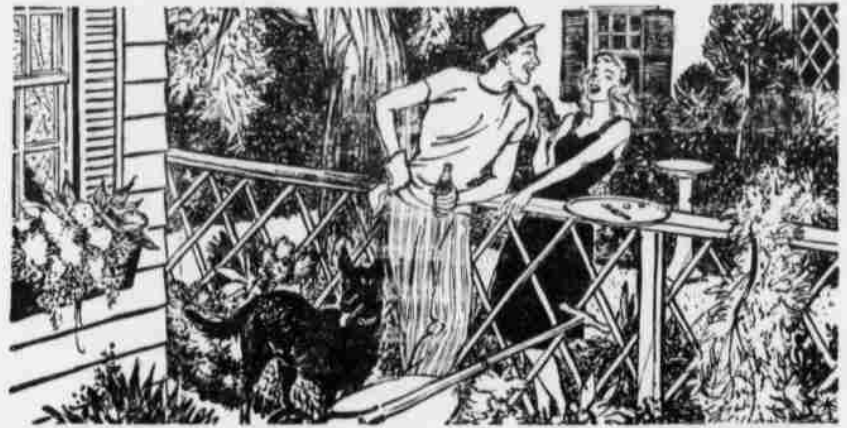
Mrs. Julian Blue and children spent the past week end with Mrs. Blue's mother in Fairmont.
