Lumberton Tobacco Market Closes

LUMBERTON, Oct. 10.-The Laumberton tobacco market has closed years, for the season with a total of 32,000,- She pounds sold since the opening August 1. A little more than \$14,000,000 was paid out to farmers for the tobacco that went over the umberton auction floors.

When final figures are in it is beleved that Lumberton will have held its position as that of the tenth ranking flue-cured tobacco market in the nation in pounds sold. Seventy-seven markets handle the flue-cured tobacco of the five states of the southeast producing this type

Announcement has been made to the effect that this is the last year the Lumberton market will be supervised by Jasper C. Hutto, he having resigned from that post, effective as of January I, to devote his full time to the office of executive secretary of the Lumberton Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture. For the last several years he has been dividing his time between the two places.

R. C. Rankin has resigned from the post of supervisor of the Greenville tobacco market to succeed Mr. Hutto on the Lumberton market.
