

### State College Answers Timely Farm Questions

QUESTION: How should I go about controlling cow pox?

ANSWER: Dr. C. D. Grinnella, veterinarian for the Agricultural Experiment Station at State College, suggests that you segregate the infected animals from the remainder of the herd and arrange for a separate caretaker for these animals, if possible. In mild cases he suggests cleanliness in milking by dipping the teats after each milking in chlorine solution. Tincture of iodine in glycerine of equal parts is also useful. When cow pox is neglected the disease often becomes a predisposing cause to mastitis, an inflammation of the udder, which is the dairyman's No. 1 problem.

QUESTION: What is the best control measure for tobacco falling down in the field?

ANSWER: Howard R. Garriss, Extension plant pathologist, says that you are probably referring to the core shank, or rotten stalk disease, which is found in many tobacco soils, particularly on soils that are not well drained. The disease also does considerable damage where plants have been injured by wire worms. There is no effective control measure, according to Garriss. He suggests planting the tobacco only on well drained soils. The disease is most severe during wet seasons.

QUESTION: Can you tell me about a new weed killer I have found on the market?

### Government Frees Shotgun Shells

Forty Million Surplus Shells To Be Sold This Month.

Duck, pheasant and other small game hunters will have plenty of 12-gauge shotgun shells on hand this fall for their favorite sport, according to an announcement just issued in Washington by the Office of Surplus Property, Department of Commerce.

Over forty million rounds of twelve gauge shells, frozen for military use since the start of the war, will be sold this month to dealers throughout the eleven United States Regional Offices of the office of Surplus Property.

The sale began October 13, 1945. Supplies of shotgun shells for civilian use have been extremely short and the return of this ammunition to dealers shelves in time for the hunting seasons will be welcomed by sportsmen the country over. The shells will also be useful to farmers and ranchers for crop and livestock protection.

The ammunition being sold is of the standard commercial type used by hunters and includes both bird-

shot and "buckshot." The major quantity of the shells are loaded with "birdshot" or 1-1/8 ounce No. 8 chilled shot, with a standard powder load of three drams. The remainder are loaded with 00 "buckshot"—9 pellets longrange powder load of 3 3/4 drams.

Prices on the shells loaded with "birdshot" are as follows: Wholesaler—\$25.93 per 1000 shells; Chain and mail order house—\$26.52 per 1000 shells; Retailer—\$32.41 per 1000 shells; OPA retail ceiling \$2.80 per 1000 shells or \$1.07 per box of 25 shells.

Prices on the shells loaded with "buckshot" are as follows: Wholesaler—\$33.42 per 1000 shells; Chain and mail order house—\$36.76 per 1000 shells; Retailer—\$41.73 per 1000 shells; OPA ceiling \$55.20 per 1000 shells or \$1.38 per box of 25 shells.

To effect equitable distribution, minimum and maximum quantities which may be purchased have been established.

charge of Extension agronomy. It will kill the leaves on poison ivy but will probably not kill the roots. It is not effective on crabgrass, quackgrass, Johnson grass, nutgrass, or other weedy grasses and sedges. There is danger in using your garden sprayer in putting out this material. A small amount of it will endanger useful plants. The material seems to offer great possibilities when adapted to the type of weeds for which it is best suited.
