has a stake in the efforts of growers to step up fertility of their soil. In many soil conservation districts during the war our field buying offices found production of fruits and vegetables up as much as 20 percent. Much of this was due to pre-war soil-saving practices.

Baum pointed out that at the present time more than half of the nation's agricultural land-nearly 800,000,-000 acres on 3,592,000 farms n45 states-is under such planning, more than 228,000 North Carolina farms enrolled.

Besides improving the quality and increasing the volume of farm production cropland conservation coincides with a growing efficency in the distribution of food, he said. The war emphasized the need for beter packaging, speedier shipment, more efective refrigeration and a oncerted war on waste.

Combined with such improvements in distribution, he efforts of farmers to produce more efficiently will mean a general reduction of the nation's food bill and an increase in farm income, Baum said.
