The next few weeks is a good time to apply lime to pasture land and on land that will be seeded to permanent pasture in February. The land should be broke or disked before spreading the lime. The fertilizer can be applied just before seeding time.

Farm machinery should be painted, greased, and stored under a shed for winter. Be sure that all moving parts are greased.
