ilies, were helped in disaster
(fire) in the amount of \$618.57.

The camp and hospital commit-
tee, Miss Josephine Hall, chair-
man, made the following report:

In July, 1946, the Camp and
Hospital Council program of the
American Red Cross was chan-
ged to Community Service to
Camps and Hospitals. In Decem-
ber, a request list was received
by the local Community Service
Chairman from the Regional hos-
pital at Fort Bragg for the follow-
ing: 10 cakes, 20 dozen cookies,

1 dozen boxes tinsel for tree dec-
orations, 1 dozen boxes balls for
tree decorations, 1 dozen boxes
snow for tree decorations, 50
gift prizes for bingo parties, 38
of the gift prizes were given by
Home Demonstration Club mem-
bers and twelve by Eastern Star
members. Funds from the local
chapter treasury paid for the
cakes, cookies, and tree decora-
tions.

In January, Home Demon-
stration Club members were asked
to make 75 children's garments. 150
yards of material was made into
45 girls' skirts for war children.

These are to be sent to the South-
eastern Area office in Atlanta
and from there they will be ship-
ped overseas. Clothing leaders
from several of the Home Dem-
onstration clubs in the county
met in the Home Agent's office
one afternoon to cut out the
skirts which were later distrib-
uted at club meetings.
