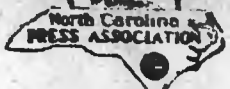

In 1946, people in the United
States ate more of these foods
than in 1941: dairy products, veg-
etables and fruits, meat, poultry,
game and fish, green, and yellow

sweet potatoes, dry beans, peas,
nuts, soya flour, cocoa, tea, and
coffee. They ate less grain pro-
