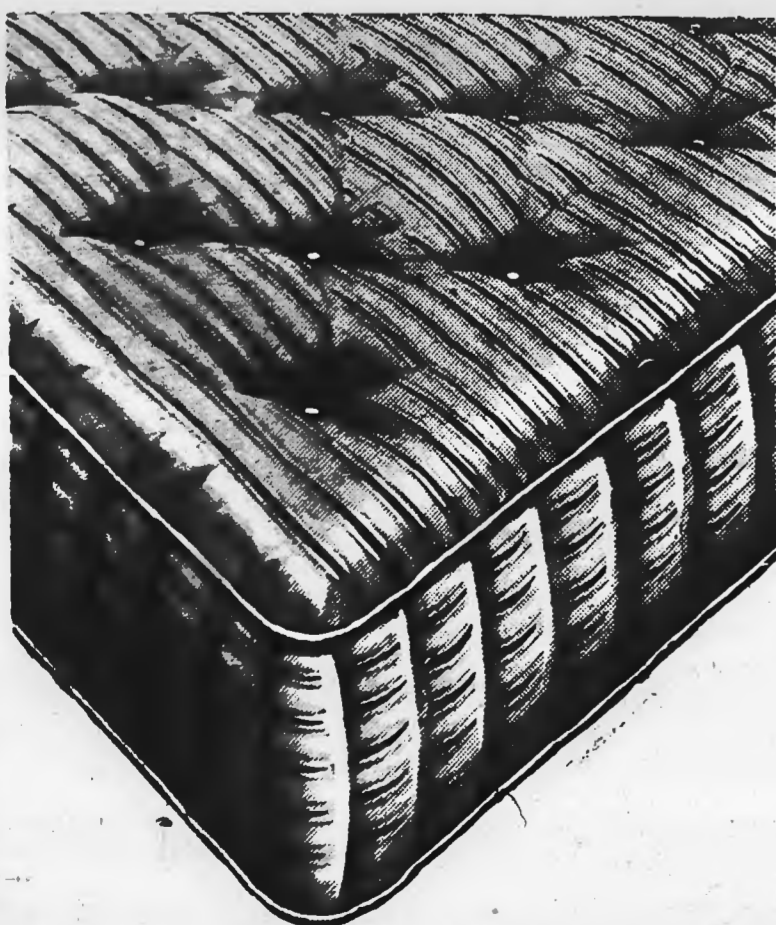

Important Notice To All Tobacco Growers

If you sold tobacco on the Fayetteville Market last year you are eligible to VOTE in a referendum to be held from June 5th to June 7th, inclusive, to determine whether the Fayetteville Tobacco Market shall be designated for free and mandatory inspection of tobacco. The service consists of tobacco inspection and market news. If the referendum is carried, the cost of this service will be paid by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Under the plan, growers will be furnished reliable and unbiased information as to the quality of tobacco offered for sale and current market prices on a grade basis.

Competent graders will be placed on the floors of the warehouses to examine all of the tobacco prior to the sale and determine its official standard grade. These grades will be written in a special space provided for the purpose on warehouse tickets.

If your ballot does not reach you by mail you may secure one from the AAA office or the County Agents office in the County Office Building In Raeford.
