NURSE AID COURSE AT HIGHSMITH HOSPITAL WILL BEGIN JULY 1

FAYETTEVILLE—A course in nurse aid training to fit young women to care for mildly ill, convalescent, and aged patients will commence at Highsmith hospital here July 1. It is designed for those who are interested in health work and the care of the sick, but who do not meet the educational requirements for the study of professional nursing.

"Successful completion prepares the worker for a useful lifetime vocation," declares Miss C. Margaret Johnson, director of nursing, "and there is great demand for workers with this type of training."

Requirements for admission are:

1. Age: 18 to 45.
2. Education: A minimum of 3 years of high school.
3. Good health.
4. Dependability and an interest in human welfare.

The length of the course is one year of which three months is instruction in the class room and at the bedside, and nine months practical application. Topics covered in the course include: personal hygiene and sanitation, ethics, nutrition and home man-

WEST POINT CADETS VISIT FORT BRAGG

The first group of 300 West Point cadets began arriving by plane at Pope Field in Fort Bragg at 5:00 p. m., June 23 to attend the airborne school presented by the "All America" 82nd Airborne division.

The class of '49 has been divided into two groups of 300 men each. The first group which arrived the 23rd of June will stay until July 2, and the second group will arrive the 5th of July and stay until the 14th of July. Their arrival at Fort Bragg is the culmination of an all service concentrated course in the modern developments of military science and tactics.

From Fort Bragg, the cadets will go back to Stewart Field at West Point, N. Y., to resume studies based on the information they have learned.

DISABLED VETS MAY REENLIST IN GRADE DURING THIS MONTH

FORT FRAGG—Partially disabled combat wounded veterans of World War II have until 30 June to apply for reenlistment in the regular army and retain the grade which they held at time of discharge. Previously the deadline was set 31 March.

This extension was decided upon in order to make an army career available to disabled veterans who did not learn of the original order authorizing their enlistment until too late to meet the 31 March date.

The new ruling applies to all former enlisted men wounded during World War II who submit applications for a three-year enlistment on or before 30 June, this year, regardless of the length of time they have been out of the army. Former enlisted men

in this category who apply for reenlistment after 30 June must apply within 20 days from the date of their discharge in order to receive their former grades.

Partially disabled veterans who were officers, warrant officers or

flight officers are eligible to re-enter the army on three-year enlistments as first or master sergeants until 30 June. After that date application for such reenlistment must be made 20 days from the last day of terminal leave.
