Cotton Contest Draws 485 Entries

North Carolina's Five Acre Cotton Contest this year will have almost twice as many entries as the 270 farmers who competed last year, says J. A. Shanklin, Agronomy Extension specialist at State College.

On the closing date for entries in the contest 485 farmers had declared their intentions to compete for the \$800 state prize, Mr. Shanklin said. "It is doubtful, however, that all of these contestants will choose to remain for final competition," the specialist declared, "because of crop damage and failure or other unexpected happenings."

In addition to the State prizes of \$800 and \$400 and the district prizes of \$300, \$200, and \$100 in three districts, there will be a special \$50 prize for the high contestant in each county having 10 or more growers carrying out all the requirements of the contest. No farmer will receive more than one prize award, Mr. Shanklin said.

Scotland and Harnett Counties lead the state in number of entries, with each having 36. Johnston is second with 29; Mecklenburg, third with 27; and Anson fourth with 24.

Thomas F. Moore of Mecklenburg County was declared State winner in last year's contest by producing 1,434 pounds of lint cotton per acre.
