

MORE ABOUT Deer Season

venber 11 Mondays through Saturdays, and November 12 through January 1 on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays only.

Hunting for deer is permitted in Bladen, Brunswick, Columbus, Cumberland, Harnett, Hoke, Lee, Moore, New Hanover, Richmond, Robeson, Sampson, and Scotland counties from October 6 through November 27, Mondays through Saturdays, and from November 28 through January 1 on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays only. Since Monday, October 6, is a day (no hunting) day in these counties, the actual open season will get under way on Tuesday, the 7th.

The bear regulations: Hunting for bear is allowed in Beaufort, Carteret, Craven, Duplin, Greene, Jones, Lenoir, Onslow, Pamlico, Pitt, and Hyde counties Mondays through Saturdays from October 6 through November 27, and on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays only from November 28 through January 1; and in Pender County, Mondays through Saturdays from October 6 through November 11, and on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays only from November 12 through January 1.

The squirrel regulations: Hunting for squirrels is allowed in Anson, Bertie, Camden, Currituck, Dare, Edgecombe, Gates, Halifax, Hertford, Hyde, Johnston, Lee, Martin, Moore, Montgomery, Nash, Northampton, Pasquotank, Perquimans, Rich-

mond, Tyrrell, Washington, Wayne, and Wilson counties from October 6 through January 1. An exception to this is that there is no open season on Roanoke Island, Dare County.

Hunting for squirrels is allowed in Beaufort, Carteret, Craven, Duplin, Greene, Jones, Lenoir, Onslow, Pamlico, and Pitt counties from October 6 through November 27, Mondays through Saturdays, and from November 28 through January 1 on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays only; and in Pender County, October 6 through November 11, Mondays through Saturdays, and from November 12 through January 1 on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays only.

Hunting for squirrels is allowed in Bladen, Brunswick, Columbus, Cumberland, Harnett, Hoke, New Hanover, Robeson, Sampson, and Scotland counties from October 6 through January 1 on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays only. Since Monday, October 6, is a day in these counties, the actual opening will come on Tuesday, the 7th.

Other season openings will come week after next. One of these will be the bear season, which opens October 15 in all counties except those listed above for the bear season and except Bladen, Brunswick, Columbus, Cumberland, Harnett, Hoke, New Hanover, Robeson, Sampson, and Scotland. In these counties, in which Wednesday is a day, the bear season will open Thursday the 16th. The season runs through January 1.

Also opening on October 15 is the season for Russian wild boar. This extends through January 1. Bag limits are two a day, two in possession, and two for the season.

MORE ABOUT Farm Notes

miums are higher than in previous years.

The week of October 5-11 has been designated by President Truman as National Fire Prevention Week. Every week should find farm men and women conscious of the danger of fire. Ninety percent of fires are result of carelessness.

In the United States, fire at-

tacks a farm every 15 minutes or 100 times each day. Ten farm people die each day as the result of fire. Did you know that the total fire loss this year will be about equal to the value of every productive acre and every farm building in the state of Washington? This would build 50,000 \$2000 barns. Did you know that forest fires this year will burn over an area as large as the State of New York, destroying enough timber to build 200,000 five room houses? Remember that ninety percent of the fires can be prevented. Keep trash and danger spots cleaned up.

Every farm should have a small orchard. Peaches are the basic fruit in any orchard. For ripe peaches over the longest period, it is suggested that the following varieties be put in the home orchard: Early-Red, Dixigem, Jubilee, Raritan Rose, Halehaven, Belle of Georgia, and Elberta.

October is a good month to treat peach trees for the control of peach tree borers. Use Ethylene dichloride emulsion.

Do not plant wheat before October 25 because of the hessian fly. It should be planted as soon as possible after that date. Treat all small grain seed before planting to control certain diseases.
