# NOTICE

In an effort to minimize the spread of POLIO in Hoke County, the Board of Health, on July 27, 1948, adopted the following law and regulation.

**"It shall be unlawful for any child under 16 years of age to swim in any pools, creeks, lakes or ponds, to attend any theatre, or to appear at any public gathering in Hoke County."**

This law and regulation will remain in full force and effect until notice is given of its repeal. The cooperation of every parent and child is urgently needed and requested.
