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Tributes To Dr. McCain

It was appropriate and richly deserved tribute which was paid to the memory of the late Dr. Paul P. McCain recently in the dedication of a new building of the North Carolina Sanatorium, which he served for a period of years as assistant superintendent and later for many years as superintendent, which post he occupied at the time of his death in an automobile accident two years ago.

Dr. McCain gave the most and the best of his life to the battle against tuberculosis and the cure and treatment of those afflicted with that disease, as he himself was in his early years.

In recognition of his years of loyal and effective service to the State institution, the name of the postoffice there was appropriately changed soon after his death from Sanatorium to McCain.

He was identified in an official capacity with the institution during most of its history, first as assistant to the first superintendent, Dr. L. B. McBrayer, and for many years afterwards as head of the sanatorium.

Among distinguished figures who attended and participated in the McCain memorial service and the dedication of the new building was Associate Justice Wiley Rutledge, who was once a patient of both Dr. McBrayer and Dr. McCain and who called himself an "alumnus" of Sanatorium. Justice Rutledge presided.

As The Asheville Citizen observed, a generation of North Carolinians now embarking on a great hospital and medical care program will find Justice Rutledge's eulogy to Dr. McCain as inspirational as it is fitting: "Of none can the words more truly be spoken, 'Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for a friend.' All that he was he dedicated to the service of his fellow man."

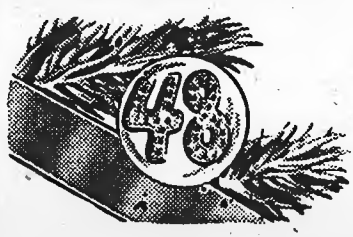
