A permanent and prosperous long time farm program cannot be based on the so-called "Cash" crops alone, but must be in balance with livestock. The ground work has been laid for a livestock program on a number of farms during the past two years I hope the program will continue. About 85 percent of the present income is derived from approximately 30 percent of the crop land. How to get more income from the other part of the land is of major importance It appears to me that a pasture and feed program with livestock would fit into the program on a number of farms. Some farms could grow beef cattle, some could have a small dairy, others could have hogs or poultry.
