MORE ABOUT SCHOOL NEWS

The county superintendent attended a called meeting of all school superintendents and school board members held in Raleigh on Monday. The meeting was called for the discussion of pending legislation affecting the schools.

The N. F. A. Chapter at Upchurch school, under the leadership of their vocational agricultural teacher, Stephen Williams, and with the assistance of County Forester McBryde and District Forester Hicks, have started a school forest on the back side of the school grounds. Already these boys have planted 5000 fine seedlings both long-leaf and loblolly. They hope to plant at least 1500 more before it gets too late this spring.

In addition to the re-forestation project, they are beginning work on a school nursery. In this nursery they are planning to raise all kinds of ornamental shrubs for the beautification of the various school grounds in the county, and for distribution to the families of the students for home beautification.

The school and the club are also cooperating with the USDA County Council in its county wide beautification project. We commend the club, its leaders, and the school for these very worthwhile activities.
