State College Farm Questions

QUESTION: Is priming recommended for burley tobacco?

ANSWER: S. N. Hawks, tobacco specialist for the State College Extension Service, says: "It has been found experimentally, both at the North Carolina research stations, and on individual farms, that priming burley tobacco once and possibly twice will increase yields about 300 to 400 pounds and bring in \$150 to \$200 more money per acre. Priming a part of the tobacco enables the producer to save the bottom leaves before they become over-ripe and let the rest of the plant remain in the field until it has become fully ripe. In recent meetings, burley producers have been very enthusiastic about the idea of increasing the quality and yields of their tobacco by priming once or twice and then cutting the stalk."

QUESTION: Is self-feeding recommended for fattening hogs?

ANSWER: Yes. Dry feed is preferable to slop because it helps to prevent digestive disorders and saves labor. The self-feeder method is the best way to feed fattening hogs, because it saves both feed and labor. It is also an ideal way to utilize dry feed, it helps keep feed clean, and it enables each pig to select its own ration free choice. When nursing sows are self-fed, the pigs learn to eat from the feeder before weaning time. When the sows are taken away the pigs will continue on the self-feeder without interruption and with little or no setback from weaning.

QUESTION: I plan to buy a home freezer. How large should it be?

ANSWER: Regular models now on the market run from four to 18 cubic feet in capacity, but it is possible to buy a chest freezer as small as a 1-2 cubic feet or a big 60-cubic foot model. As a rough guide, an average of five or six cubic feet for each person in the family is suggested. However, the choice depends a great deal on the way the freezer will be used. A city family, using it mostly for storing commercially frozen food and ice cream, may need only one or two cubic feet per person, whereas a farm family, freezing much of its yearly supply of home-produced food, may need 10 to 12 cubic feet per person. A cubic foot holds about 30 to 35 pounds of food. It is better to overestimate on size than to underestimate. The trend of demand in both freezers and refrigerators is toward larger sizes because families are coming to appreciate more and more the advantages of refrigerated and frozen storage for food. Moreover, the larger freezers cost less per cubic foot.

Sweet Potato Seed Crop Is Certified

The North Carolina Crop Improvement Association has approved 7,463 bushels of sweet potatoes, all of the Porto Rico variety, for certification as seed, according to Foil McLaughlin, research instructor in agronomy at State College.

More than a third of the total certified stock was grown in Johnston County, where 2900 bushels passed the final bin inspection. Columbus County was second with 1120 bushels, and Duplin was third with 875 bushels. Other counties producing more than 200 bushels of certified seed included Harnett, Pitt, Gates, Wayne, Carteret, Craven, and Anson.

Potatoes were rejected on only six of the 25 farms where inspections were held, as compared with a much higher percentage of rejections last year. Not a single lot of seed stock was rejected this year because of black rot storage disease.

McLaughlin says black rot has been eliminated largely because certified seed growers are using vine cuttings instead of sprouts or plants. The disease does not attack any of the above-ground parts of the sweet potato plant.

Another storage disease, internal cork, caused one rejection.

A total of 32 farmers began production of seed potatoes last summer, but seven were eliminated during the growing season because wilt was found in their fields.

The system of roads from courthouse to courthouse did not start in the 1920's, for there were roads from Lumberton to Carthage, and from each and every county seat to county seat.

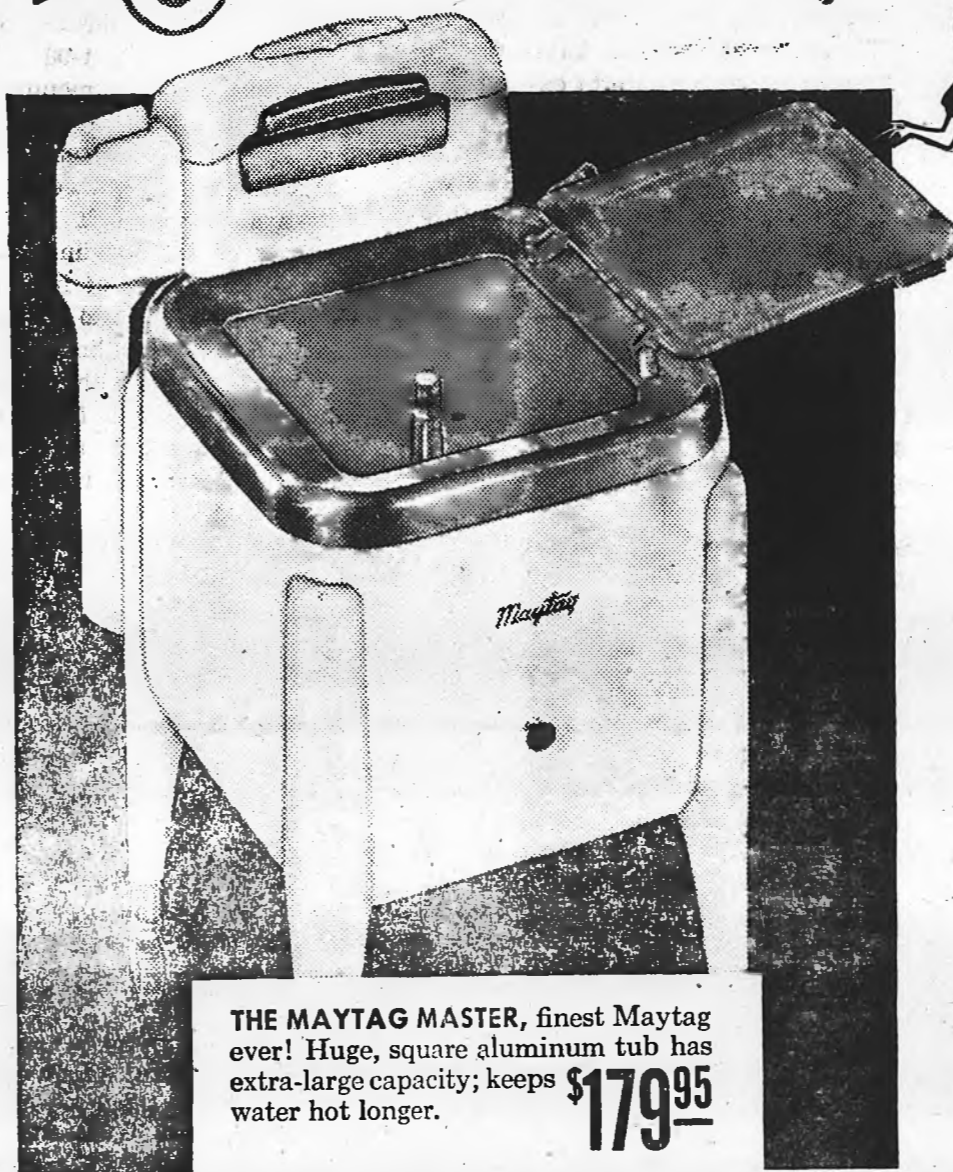

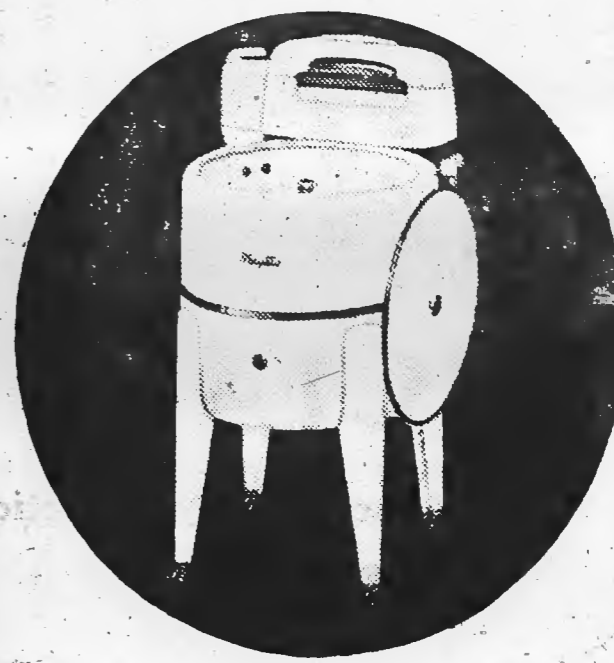
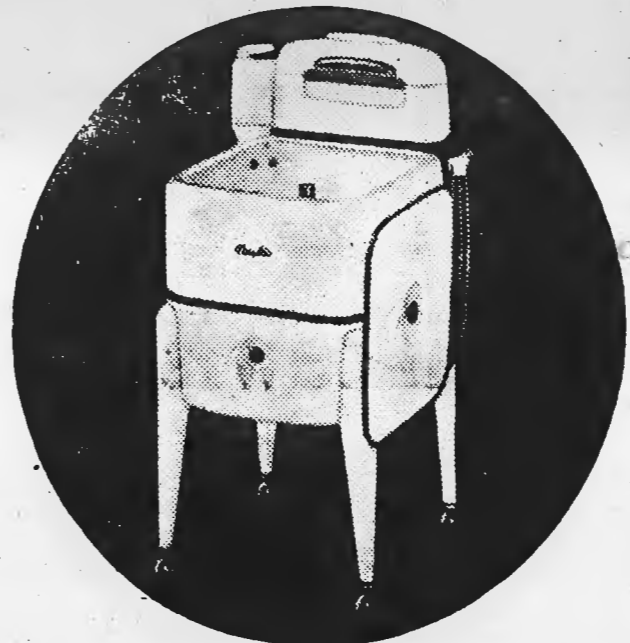
