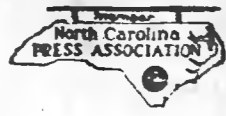

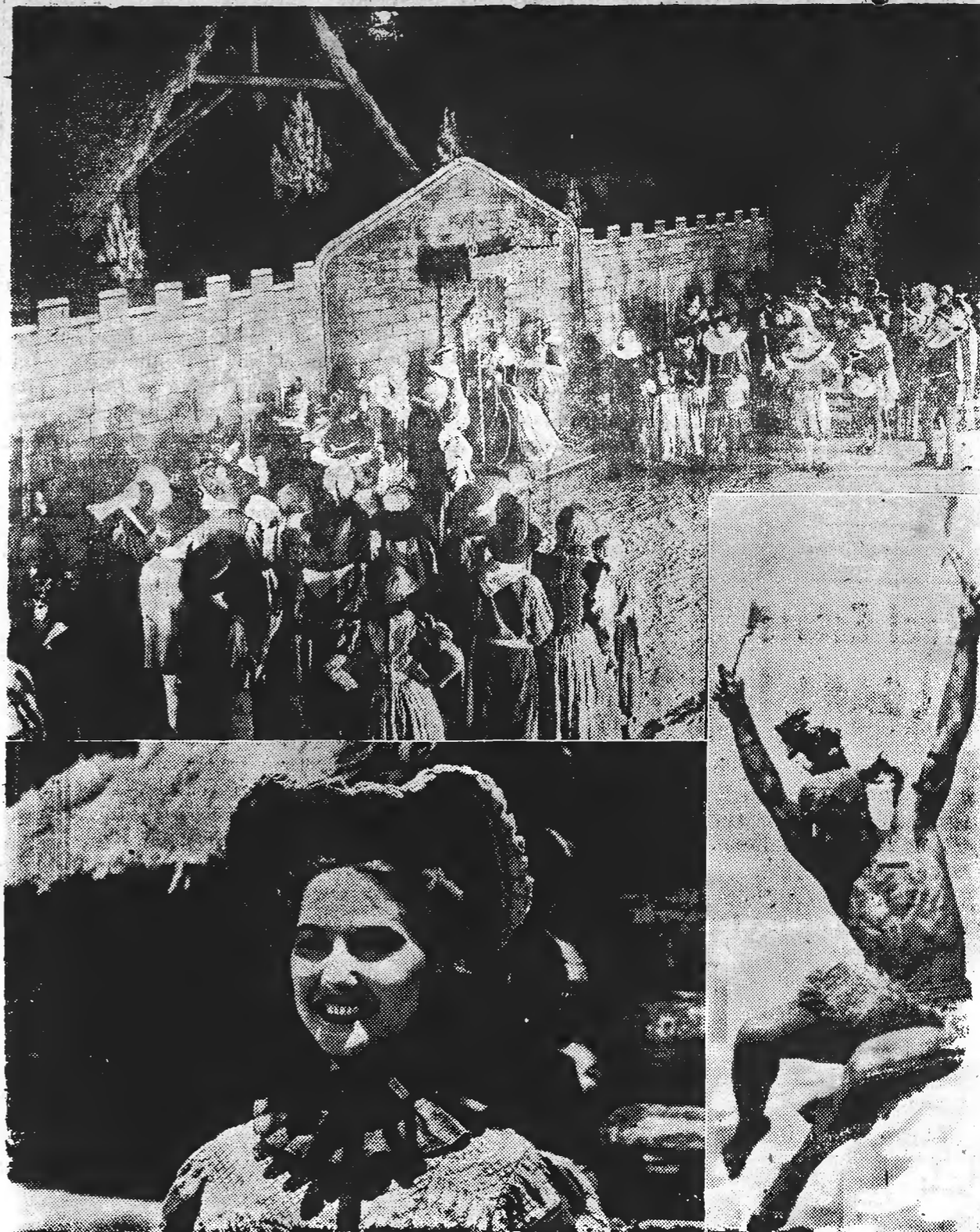
Mrs. James Veasey and children of Aberdeen spent last week with Mrs. Veasey's parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. J. McBryde.
