worked out by Robert C. Bird, talented young Ohio musician, and A. J. Fletcher of Raleigh, who is State Opera Chairman for the North Carolina Federation of Music Clubs. Mr. Bird, who was engaged by Mr. Fletcher to direct the program, now is setting up headquarters in Raleigh.

Mr. Bird will be available to communities that want to present operas, or selections from operas, with either local talent or talent available in other North Carolina communities. Mr. Fletcher, who conceived the plan, aims to make opera as popular in North Carolina as other types of music, including hill-billy tunes. He also intends to furnish a medium for the voices and acting ability of North Carolina singers who have no other outlet for their talents.

Mr. Bird came to Raleigh from Fort Worth, Texas, where he directed the Civic Opera Guild. A baritone and expert on stage settings, he has sung and worked with operatic groups in New Orleans, Mobile, Ala., and Jackson, Miss. During the past summer he directed the Colony Opera Guild at Schroon Lake, N. Y. Now 31 he is a veteran of overseas service with the Army. Irrigation Systems To Be Demonstrated

Farmers interested in irrigation of truck crops, tobacco, and pasture are invited to attend a demonstration on the J. H. Bradshaw farm in Sampson County at 2 p. m. on Friday, October 7, according to H. M. Ellis, in charge of agricultural engineering for the State College Extension Service.

Bradshaw's farm is located one mile from Clinton on the highway to Faison and Goldsboro.

Ellis says the most modern portable irrigation systems making use of revolving sprinklerheads will be exhibited and demonstrated at the meeting. All the principal irrigation equipment companies serving Eastern North Carolina will have representatives present to demonstrate their outfits.

Those attending will be given an opportunity to ask questions and discuss the merits of the various systems.

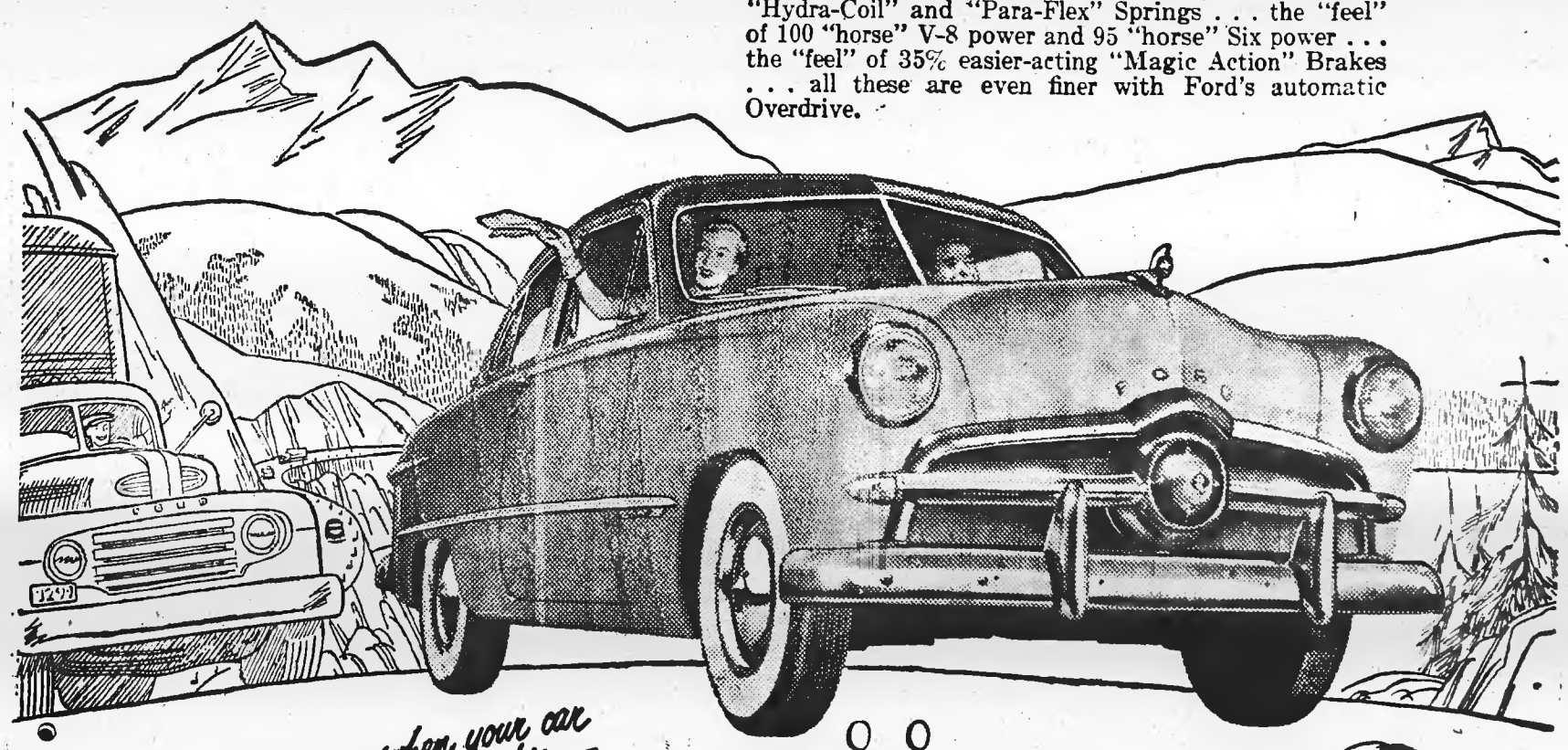
