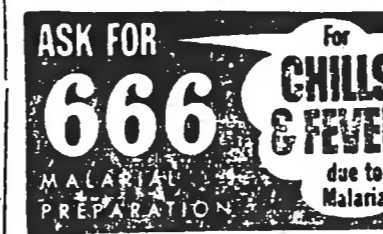
There will be preaching service at Tabernacle church here Sunday night conducted by the Rev. C. W. Myrick of Cumberland, who preached last Sunday morning.

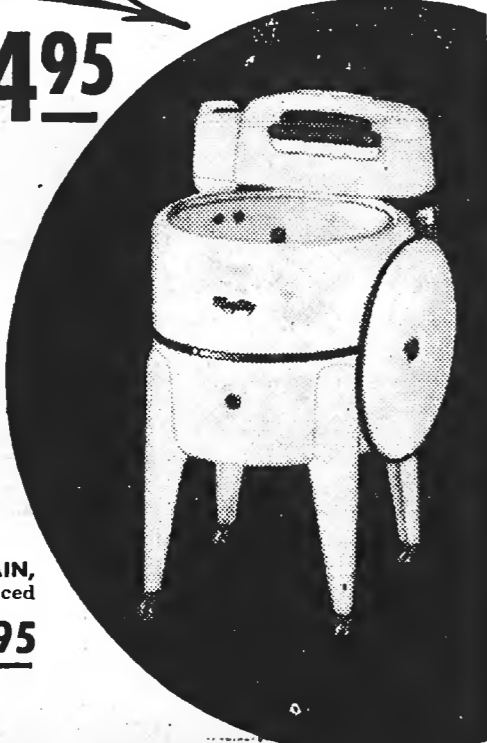

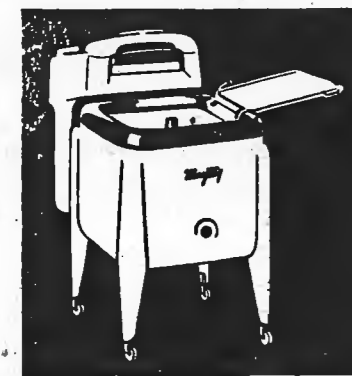

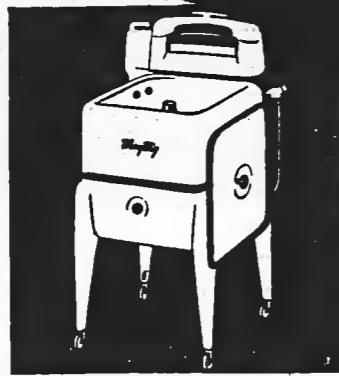
