The boys in Mr. Phillips' agriculture classes are taking up a unit of work in woodcraft. Each boy has to figure and make out a bill for the making of a table.



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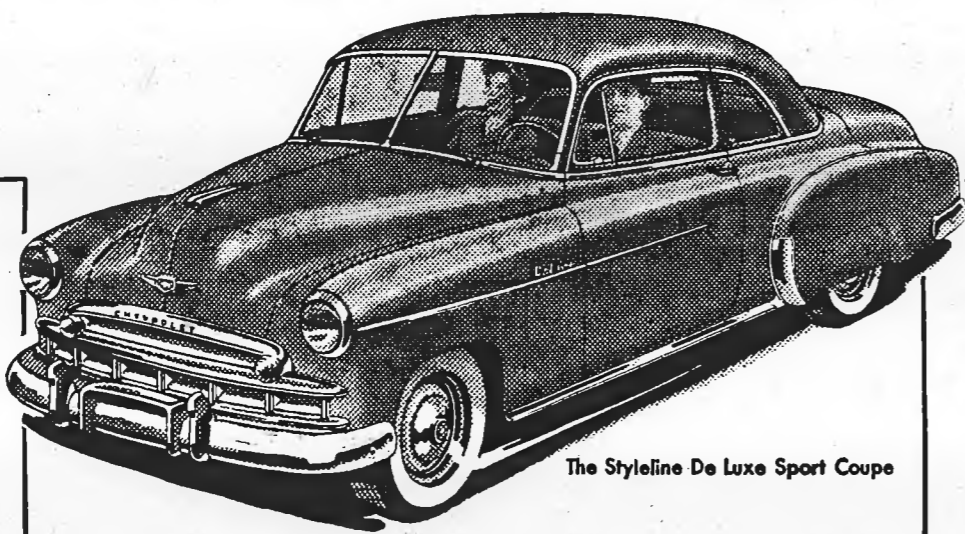
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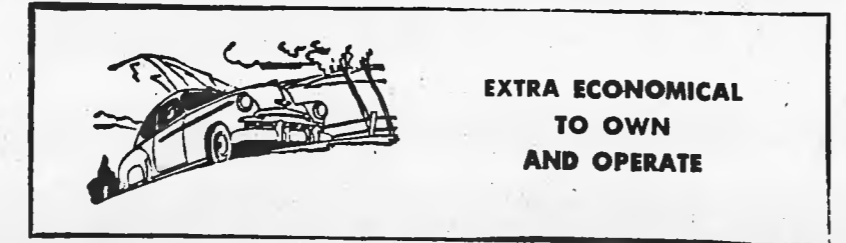
