Home Agent's Narrative Report For March

"Gardens" was the subject at Home Demonstration and 4-H Club meetings in March in Hoke County. One hundred sixty-six (166) women attended the 14 Home Demonstration Club meetings and 137 4-H Club girls were present at the five 4-H Club meetings. Garden slides were shown and explained and reasons for planting gardens, varieties for planting in this section, growing early vegetable plants and insect control were also discussed.

Mrs. Mary L. McAllister and Mr. C. M. Brickhouse, District Home and Farm Agents from Raleigh, spent one morning in the county.

The Home Demonstration Agent spent one day in Clinton attending a program planning conference to discuss methods of setting up the 1951 program of work. She also spent two days in Raleigh with the executive boards of the State Home Demonstration Agents Association and the N. C. Federation of Home Demonstration Clubs.

The Pine Forest Home Demonstration Club served lunch to the Hoke County Board of Commissioners and Mr. J. A. McGoogan, the County Auditor, on Monday, March 6, the day of their regular monthly meeting. Mrs. B. L. Williamson, Mrs. Mary Helton, and Mrs. F. E. Lewis served the meal.

Twenty-one women attended a leaders' training school which was held by Miss Julia McIver on Friday afternoon, March 31. Those present included Home Demonstration Club leaders and other interested in clothing construction. The leaders will repeat the de-

monstration at their April club meetings.

On April 2nd, forty-eight girls, two leaders, Mrs. McGoogan, Hoke High Home Economics teacher and the Home Agent attended a district 4-H Clothing meeting at Southern Pines. The morning program consisted of a discussion on spring and summer fabrics, points on shopping and how leaders can assist 4-H Club members. Mary McLean, Ellen Kate Koonce, Katherine McDonald and Pat Ritter of the Hoke High School 4-H Club served as models in the Fashion Show in the afternoon.

The members of the Telephone committee met as a group in the Home Agents office once during the month. At other times they came in individually to plot prospective customers on the survey map which is to be taken to the State REA office on Wednesday, April 5.

Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Matthews of the Buchan Community are giving an acre of land on the Aberdeen-Laurinburg Highway where the Buchan Community Building is to be built. The people in the community plan to raise money during the summer and fall and hope to start the building next winter. Mrs. Matthews offered the plot of land at the March meeting of the Buchan Home Demonstration Club and after some discussion it was decided to plant sweet potatoes on the land, harvest them in the fall and sell them to make some money to be used toward building. Ufa Matthews, Talmadge Bobbitt and others in the community bedded the potatoes and are taking the responsibility of setting out the slips. The Home

Demonstration Club paid for the seed potatoes.

Mrs. T. C. Sinclair, County Recreational leader and the Home Agent attended a District recreational meeting in Lumberton on the evening of March 28. Dr. Harold Myer of the North Carolina Recreation Commission was principal speaker.

of fields. Paris green and London purple proved of some value against several insects, but the coming of the boll weevil in the 1890's led to active research and experimentation.



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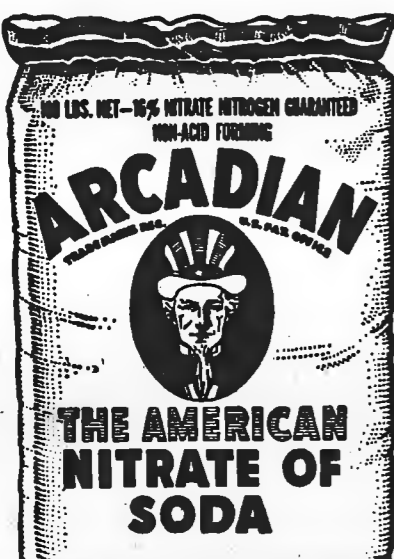
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NOTICE OF NEW REGISTRATION For All Voters Of Hoke County, North Carolina

Notice is hereby given to all voters of Hoke County, that a new registration has been ordered by the Hoke County Board of Elections for each and every voting precinct in said County. The Registration books will be opened at each voting precinct in the county, beginning on Saturday, April 29 at 9 o'clock A. M., 1950, and will remain open each Saturday for the registration of voters through Saturday, May 13th. The following Saturday, May 20th will be challenge day and the Primary Election will be held on Saturday May 27th.

The voters in Mildouson Precinct (Stonewall Township) may register at the Dundarrach Trading Company Store in Dundarrach, as has heretofore been the custom. A list of the Registrars who will have charge of the Registration will be published in this paper next week, and also posted at the Court House Door in Raeford. While the Registrars will be at the respective voting places on the Saturdays above named, except as to Mildouson where the registration will be held at Dundarrach Trading Company Store, as aforesaid, any voter desiring to register on any other day than Saturday between the 29th of April and 13th of May, may do so by seeing the Registrar in his or her Precinct.

This new registration is called for the reason that a new registration book is being installed in each precinct as provided by the last General Assembly, and it is desired that the new book shall contain, as near as possible, an accurate list of the qualified voters of each precinct in the County.

It is urged that every qualified voter in the County, register during this registration period, whether or not you have heretofore registered, as the old registration books will not be used and you must be registered in the new book in order to vote.

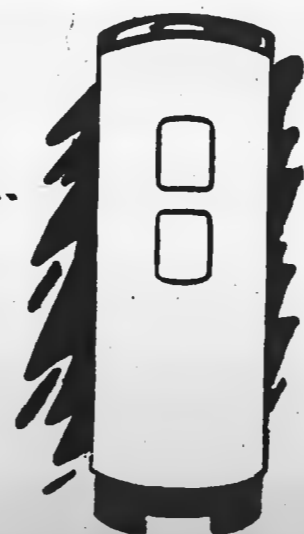

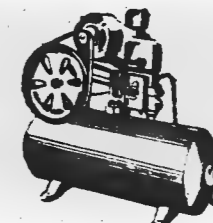
