**Home Agent's Narrative Report For May**

The fourteen Home Demonstration Clubs in Hoke County met in May with 158 women attending the meetings. The demonstration given was on "Oven Meals." It was emphasized that Oven Meals are economical, destroy less food value because they are cooked at moderate temperatures, they save fuel, they can be prepared ahead of time, they keep well and can

be held back for a short time. They are practical when entertaining as the hostess is more free to join her guests and she can postpone serving for a few minutes if necessary. Three or four oven dishes were prepared, cooked and served at each meeting. Miss Grace McKenzie, Home Economist for the Carolina Power and Light Company gave the demonstration at two meetings and the Home Agent at the others.

The Mt. Pleasant Club served lunch to the County Commission-Auditor, and Joe Gullede, the Clerk of the Court on the first Monday in May.

The Home Agent spent the week of May 22-27 in Manteo attending a frozen foods school. Speakers from the U. S. Department of Agriculture in Washington, and TVA in Tennessee, the N. C. Wildlife Resources Commission and the N. C. Extension Service from Raleigh were heard. Demonstrations on freezing fruits, vegetables and meats were also given. Miss Nita Orr, Extension Frozen Foods Specialist, planned the program.

Mrs. Virginia S. Swain, Extension Family Relations Specialist, came to Raeford on the afternoon of May 3 to train the Family Relations leaders on "The Art of Staying Young." Twenty women were present at the meeting. The leaders will repeat Mrs. Swain's discussion at their June club meetings.

Mrs. B. F. McGregor, president of the Mildouson Club, gave an all-day Slip Cover demonstration at her home on May 4. Twenty-four women were present. Each person attending brought a "covered dish" and lunch was served in Mrs. McGregor's back yard.

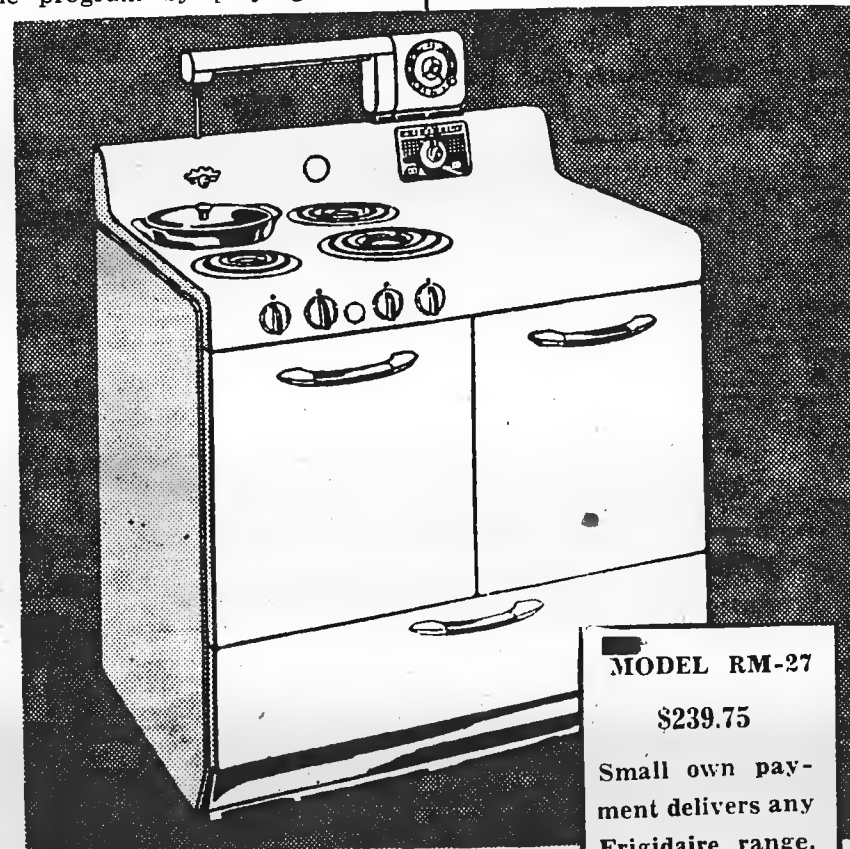
