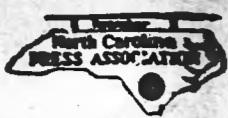

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## Dies In Penna.

Mrs. Emilie Lawrence Reed, widow of Dr. Walter Reed, the conqueror of yellow fever, died early Sunday at her home in Pennsylvania. She was 94.

Born in Murfreesboro, N. C., Mrs. Reed was one of nine children of John and Hannah Rea Lawrence. She was married to Reed in 1876, when he was a first lieutenant in the Army medical corps.

The noted bacteriologist, for whom the Army's Walter Reed

hospital at Washington is named was selected in 1899 to head a commission to study the cause of yellow fever in Cuba.
