North Carolina's first provision for aid to dependent children was made in the 1923 "Mother's Aid Law."

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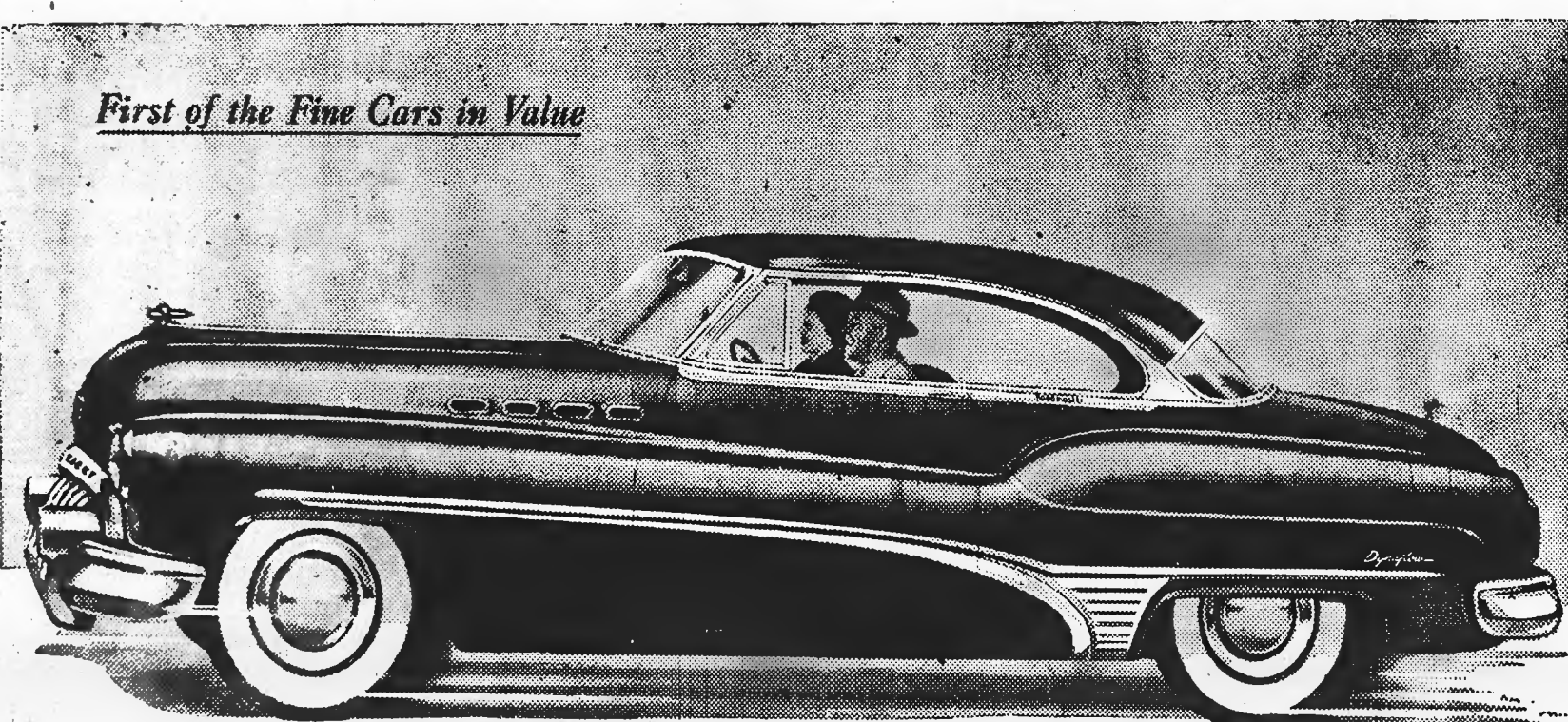
