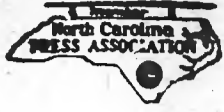

## Sanatorium Ayrshires Top Producers

The purebred Ayrshire dairy herd at North Carolina Sanatorium, McCain, N. C., has achieved top recognition during a recent month for outstanding production. The Sanatorium producers are credited with averaging 916 lbs. of 3.8% milk and 35 lbs. of butterfat for the respective testing month, which places them among the nation's top Ayrshire herds in the Ayrshire Herd Test Division

of 75 to 100 cows. In computing this average the Ayrshire Breeders' Association includes every cow in the herd either milking or dry.

With 15,000 Ayrshire cows on test, the Ayrshire breed holds the record among all dairy breeds as having the highest percentage of its cows on test.

Breaking all previous records for the automobile industry, Chevrolet dealers in the first six months of 1950 sold 213,712 trucks. In only four previous years have 12 full
