Do You Have a Maid?

Not so many households these days can answer yes, but those who do have a maid or any other household worker will need a copy of a brief booklet bearing that question as a title.

Vernon D. Herbert, Manager of the Fayetteville Social Security office, began distributing this booklet today. This colorful leaflet sets out, in a few sentences, just how the lady of the house, or any employer of domestic help in or around the house, may tell whether or not the worker is brought under the new Social Security law which becomes effective on January 1, 1951.

MAID'S DANCING MOOD

The work of those regularly employed in private homes will be credited to social security and the employer will be responsible for reporting wages, along with Social Security taxes to the Collector of Internal Revenue.

The title of the pamphlet also includes the titles Laundress, Cook, Chauffeur and Gardener. Any of these, or any other persons employed regularly for work in or around a private household may come under the new law, and Herbert urges the employers of such persons to request a free copy of the booklet.

A simple test in the booklet will tell whether a maid or cook or laundress, will get the protection of social security—and whether the housewife should start making reports next year. If so, there is a postage paid postal card in the Government-issued booklet which the household should mail to the Collector of Internal Revenue for instructions.

Herbert stated that these booklets are available to anyone interested and that a limited supply are available at any post office, or may be secured by calling the Social Security office in Fayetteville, Telephone 4880, or drop us a postal card asking for the booklet, "Do You Have a Maid?" Address Social Security Administration, Fayetteville, N. C.

For the domestic worker's information about her new social security protection, a special leaflet is available at the Social Security office. Herbert pointed out that regularly employed domestic workers will need a Social Security Account Number Card after January 1, 1951.

Hiking Along

Of more than thirty Sparrows occurring in North Carolina, either rarely or with some degree of regularity, to me the White-throated is the most appealing.

This Sparrow is a winter visitor or throughout the state, usually arriving in October and leaving for the North in May. This bird has a rusty-brown back streaked with black and the crown has a white median and two lateral black stripes with a white stripe over the eye changing to yellow in front. The throat is white in sharp contrast to the ashy breast. This sparrow is slightly larger than our common English Field Sparrow, more nearly the size of our Eastern Song Sparrow. It breeds from Central Canada to New York and winters from Connecticut to Florida.

This lively little Sparrow is usually found in flocks in and about the shrubbery on lawn or garden and in weed patches, along hedgerows, and in thickets along field borders. Since the habitat of this bird and the Slate colored Junco, another winter visitor, is similar, they are occasionally seen together.

Perhaps the most attractive trait of this bird is its sweet,

plaintive song which is heard commonly from its arrival until cold weather, and again in the spring, although it is not unusual to hear its song throughout the winter on warm, sunny days.

Like most of the sparrows, the White-throated feeds extensively on weed seeds, varying its diet with insects, wild berries and fruits. Both as a destroyer of noxious weed seeds and as one of our sweetest songsters, it warrants protection.

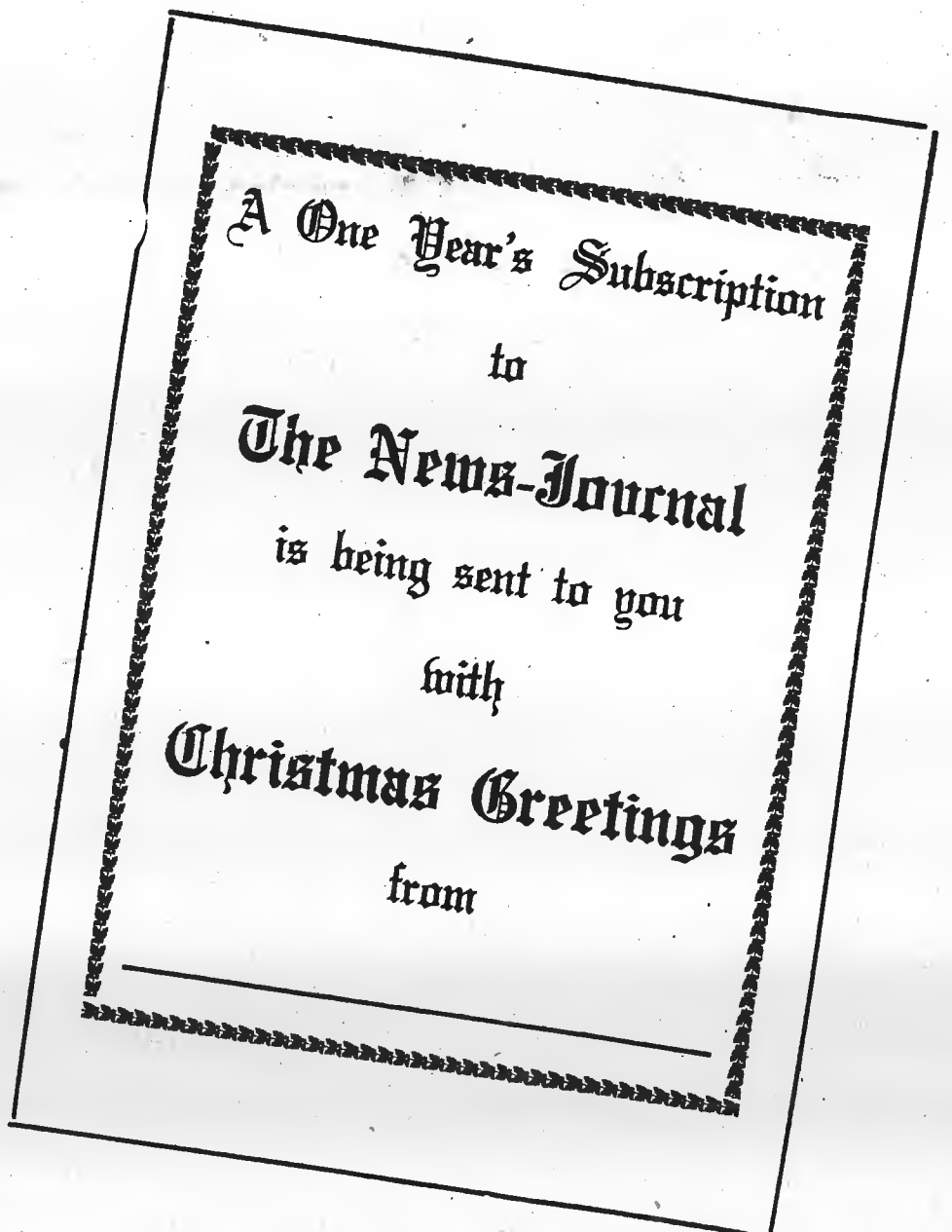
