> ime of the year for telephone New York, Dec. 13-The numcompany employes handling long ber of polio cases reported in the United States for the week ended Dec. 2 set a 23-year high, the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis announced yesterday.

The foundation also reported that 31,989 cases of polio since Jan. 1 had made 1950 the "second

severest polio year in the nation's history." Last year, with 41,442 was the worst.

The foundation listed 598 new cases for the week ended Dec. 2. It said that this figure was the highest in the 48th week of any year since 1927, when weekly polio reports were first started.
