Farmers Choose PMA Committee In Elections

Wilbur L. Smith, of route 1, Lumber Bridge, N. C. was elected chairman of the Hoke County Production and Marketing Administration Committee at the county convention held in Raeforl, December 15, 1950.

Elected as vice-chairman of the county committee was Walter L. Gibson and as regular member Robert D. Strother. The two alternates are J. H. Blythe and J. R. Hendrix.

These committeemen were elected to administer the Agricultural Conservation Program, loan program for corn. oats, wheat, soybeans, lespedeza. acreage allotment marketing quotas, and other assignments for 1951.

All of these committeemen are farmers. They are paid for only the few days they actually serve. W. L. Smith, the chairman of the Hoke County PMA Committee for 1951, owns and operates a farm located in Stonewall township. On this farm he proluces, cotton, toacco, small grain and

The vice-chairman, W. L. Gibson, has a farm in Antioch township, where he produces cotton, tobacco, small grain and corn

R. D. Strother, the third member of the committee, owns and operates a farm in Quewhiffle township. His farming operations are devoted mostly to tobacco with some cotton, small grain,

lespedeza and corn planted. The farms of the two alterates: J. H. Blythe is located in Raeford township and J. H. Henlrix in Blue Springs township. They produce cotton, tobacco,
