Test Soils Now, Farmers Advised

Farmers planning to seed Laidino clover pastures this fall should have their soils tested early in the summer. This will permit them to receive a prompt report on the soil test and give them more time to obtain the lime and fertilizer they need.

A recent summary of soil test results shows that farms throughout the State are seeding pastures on fields that are generally more acid and at a lower fertility level than other crops. This emphasizes the importance of liming and fertilization in establishing productive pastures.

There is no need for farmers to guess at the amounts of lime and fertilizer needed on a particular piece of land. By having soil tests made they will receive lime and fertilizer recommendations based on field studies conducted by the N. C. Agricultural Experiment Station.

Containers for samples may be obtained from county agents, vocational agriculture teachers, Soil Conservation Service personnel, PMA offices, or by writing to the Soil Testing Division, N. C. Department of Agriculture, Raleigh. Full instructions for taking samples and filling out the information sheets are given on the containers.

Gross farm income for 1950 is estimated at 32.1 billion dollars, almost equal the 1949 figure of 32.2 billion. This gross includes the value of home-consumed farm products, rental value of farm dwellings, and government payments to farmers in addition to cash receipts from marketing.

Laidino clover-orchard grass mixture is excellent for hay as well as for pasture, say Clyde Weisler and O. A. Adams, both of Wake County.

Improved equipment and adoption of better practices are helping North Carolina poultrymen put better quality eggs on the market, say poultry specialists at State College.

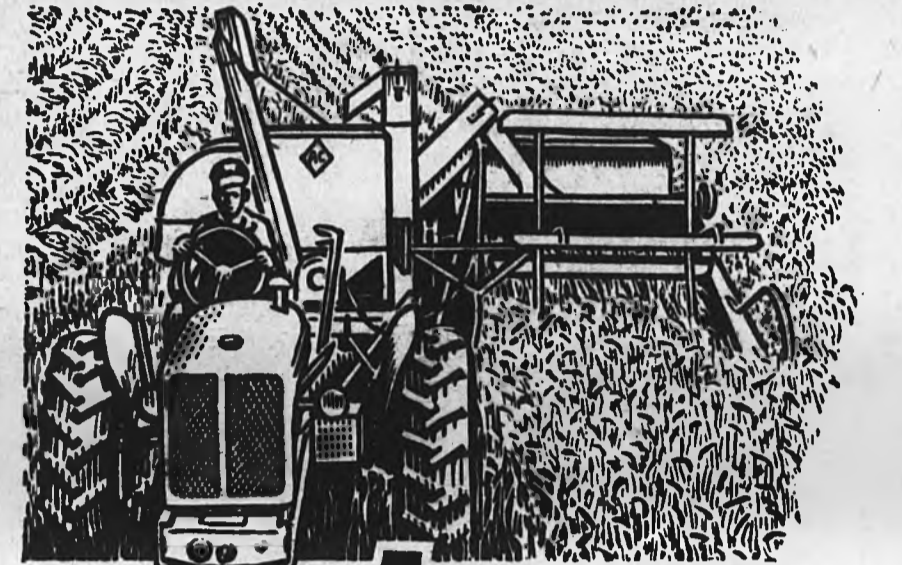
